Tow do we define hesed at Congregation Or Zarua? Hesed is the tradition of our special relationships with non-profits such as DOROT, Ronald McDonald House, and the Neighborhood Coalition for Shelter—organizations that have come to appreciate and depend on our good work and donations. It is the community of Or Zarua volunteers who rise to the occasion day after day to share their efforts, good will, camaraderie and friendship, working towards common goals while lending a helping hand. It is the leadership of OZ members who donate their expertise, bring together and inspire OZ volunteers, and organize the projects that express our concern and caring for others. And not least, it is the connection

to our Jewish heritage, not only because hesed is good, and not only because it makes us feel good, but because as Jews it is our personal and community obligation. It is the expression of loving kindness—gemilut hasadim—which, according to Pirkei Avot (Ethics of the Fathers), is one of the pillars on which the world stands. It is incumbent upon all Jews to participate, as we strive towards the goal of tikkun olam, or perfecting the world.

The Or Zarua Hesed Committee works to promote hesed through various projects within our local community, in Israel and around the world. We take our hesed seriously, and understand the importance of introducing our children early to the idea of hesed and tzedakah, in order to

incorporate volunteering and contributing as an integral part of their lives. Below we describe some of our projects, and we invite all members of OZ to participate. 

OZY SHABBAT CLASSES

Beginning January 2009, big changes are in store for our monthly Hebrew School Shabbat class, which will now be known as the Junior Congregation. As the name Junior Congregation implies, there will be a prayer service for students grade 2 and up, Tefilah will be student lead. Mirroring Or Zarua services in the Main Sanctuary, service leaders of the Junior Congregation will have the opportunity to choose different melodies as well as to teach new melodies. Of course, all student prayer services will be supervised by Or Zarua Hebrew School teachers.

The Junior Congregation will also learn about the Parashah, commentaries, the Haftorah, and the holidays through discussions. Parents are welcome to join their children, to listen, to participate in the discussion, and to learn together.

A special Kiddush will be held for the Junior Congregation. When appropriate, snacks will be holiday specific, such as *sufganiyot* (jelly doughnuts) for Hanukkah.

We believe that the Junior Congregation will be a great preparation for Bar and Bat Mitzvah. By leading the Junior Congregation service, students will become more familiar with the Or Zarua service and more confident when they are standing at the Bimah.

The monthly Junior Congregation will be held in the Or Zarua library, beginning at 10:30 a.m. Please note that on these days, our younger students will still have their Shabbat classes on the seventh floor as before. Me'ah Offering for Spring 2009

eginning this January, Or Zarua will Donce again be the site of a Me'ah Graduate Institute course offering: "The Limits of Dissent in the Traditional Jewish Community," taught by Benjamin Gampel of the Jewish Theological Seminary. This course will discuss the time when membership within the Jewish community was compulsory, kahal organization was rigidly articulated, and individuals and groups often engaged in fierce conflict over social and ideological issues such as the nature of lewish identity and the boundaries of the Jewish faith. At times, sectarian and messianic groups emerged from these protracted struggles which challenged the norms of

the established Jewish community. In tracing the limits of tolerable dissent over the course of Jewish history, we will also confront incidences when Jews have sought willingly, or have been compelled, to abandon their faith and redefine their sense of religion and peoplehood.

The class will meet for ten sessions on Tuesday evenings from 7:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. on January 27; February 3, 10, and 24; March 10, 17, 24, and 31; and April 21 and 28.

Drawing on the biblical chronicle of King David's life as well as on later commentaries and the Psalms—traditionally considered to be David's own words—Pinsky

teases apart the many strands of David's story and reweaves an imaginative, insightful narrative.

William Deresiewicz wrote in *The New York Times*:

The Life of David grows increasingly strong as it moves from David's early years to the years of his reign. Pinsky's

reading of David's mystifyingly disastrous attempt to take a census as the embodiment of everything threatening about his

revolutionary transformation of the Jewish people "from a masked, uncataloged, exclusionary, taboo-ridden culture of tribes to a visible, enumerated, inclusive civilization," is a tour de force of historical imagining.

Pinsky's fresh take on King David is part of the Jewish Encounters series by

well-known Jewish authors, and is available in paperback and hardcover.

to call their own. NCS provides a full continuum of services, aimed at helping people move from the streets to housing and independence. OZ projects at NCS have been numerous and on-going. Monday nights are Pizza Night at the NCS 81st Street Residence; Or Zarua provides pizza, salad and drinks. OZ volunteers set up, serve, and schmooze with the residents. Many of the residents have become long-standing friends! On Thanksgiving and Christmas Eve our volunteers box-up entrees and desserts and deliver them to the NCS residence (as well as to Ronald McDonald House). Other joint NCS projects included a "Dignity Drive" during which OZ's Hebrew School students collected undergarments and toiletries for distribution to the former 77th Street Shelter, and Purim Mitzvah projects which have entailed making sandwiches for NCS residents and collecting canned goods for donation.

Would it be a surprise to you to learn that in New York City more than 1 in every 5 Jews lives at or below the federal poverty level? Metropolitan Council on Jewish Poverty is a leader in advocating for and meeting the multiple needs of New York City's Jewish poor. While they specialize in serving neighborhoods with large pockets of Jewish poverty, Met Council serves all individuals regardless of race, ethnicity, gender, sexual orientation,

age, physical ability, language or religion. Or Zarua holds annual Hanukkah drives for gifts, books and/or warm clothing for distribution through Met Council.

DOROT's mission is to enhance the lives of Jewish and other elderly in the greater New York metropolitan area through a dynamic partnership of volunteers, professionals, and elders; to foster

mutually beneficial interaction between the generations; and to provide education, guidance, and leadership in developing volunteer-based programs for the elderly, nationally and internationally. DOROT's programs address basic needs of the elderly, such as food and housing, health and wellness services, and life management skills; provide social, cultural, religious, and educational activities to alleviate isolation and to bring the generations together; promote an ethic of volunteerism; and foster respect for human dignity among people of all ages in accordance with Jewish values.

For many years, Or Zarua volunteers have participated in the DOROT Rosh Hashanah, Hanukkah and Pesah package deliveries. Participants meet for a brief orientation at a central Upper East Side location, and are provided bags of holiday goodies to brighten the day of our homebound seniors. Visits last generally for under an hour. This is a great project for the entire family, but adult volunteers are especially needed since many seniors cannot accommodate children. This is such a beautiful mitzvah, as volunteers learn about the interesting lives of elders in our community, share stories, and create friendships. Many volunteers find themselves volunteering over and over again to visit the same seniors who have become special friends.

One of our favorite OZ hesed projects is the Annual Israeli Night event at Ronald McDonald House (pictured above).

RMDH is a residence for young cancer patients and their families who travel from around the world to receive medical treatment at New York hospitals. Or Zarua provides a kosher Israeli buffet and desserts, our own Or Zarua singers and pick-up band, and much joy and friendship to the children who are going through such difficult times. As a special treat, professional folk dancer Danny Pollack has been a

vibrant colors and charming patterns.








as free-form pinwheels and floating circles.
