I am the new Director of Youth Education and Programming at Congregation Or Zarua. I am excited to be able to continue my work here at Or Zarua, and to expand it to include educational and programmatic endeavors for children and youth of all ages!

After a vibrant 26 years, Or Zarua is at a pivotal moment as a community, one that is full of possibilities. This is the time to grow and develop our learning community while preserving our most engaging and indispensable programs.

Working with Rabbi Bolton, the synagogue staff, the Youth and Education Committee, and the synagogue's member families, I plan to reinvigorate OZ's programs of child and youth education with the goal of reaching our full potential. We will bring innovation and choice to our learners while ensuring that they develop a deep knowledge of Jewish ritual, text and history, and Hebrew language, as well as love for Israel and Judaism.

I am proud to introduce Or LeAtid, which translates to Light for the Future, our new comprehensive program for youth education and engagement. Or LeAtid is an umbrella banner that includes our new Hebrew School 2.0 for elementary school

students, our B'nei Mitzvah Scholars program for students in grades 6–7, and Teens@OZ, a newly developed weekly program for grades 8–12. Also part of Or LeAtid are two opportunities to participate in Arts and Action mini-courses for grades 6–12, in addition to our Kadima (grades 6–8) and USY (grades 9–12) Youth Group Chapters. Finally, this year Or LeAtid will offer extensive family programming and regular Shabbat services for youth of all ages.

President's Message

When we imagine summertime, we tend to think of the living as easy. But summer is a more complex

season than it seems. Although superficially a season of pure fun and relaxation, as a function of the Jewish calendar it is less straightforward. Come to Or Zaruva this summer and enjoy its complexity, both its casual and serious character.

Of course, I hope that you will join us at Or Zaruva throughout the year, as the nuanced rhythms of the calendar pulsate within our gracious building, through an abundance of services, classes, and programs for Congregants of all ages. You can find your spiritual or social niche in our meaningful prayer services and sophisticated Torah discussions, or as a participant in our hesed activities, musicality events, or art exhibits. I urge you to expand your synagogue repertoire, sampling services and activities novel to you.

And summer is an optimal time to experiment. Jewish life at Or Zaruva does not stop in June; we are *not* a nine-month-a-year enterprise. With some Congregants out of town, we need our other members to step up and fill out our services and events. But it is also a particularly opportune time to experience the genuine warmth and intimacy of our unique shul community. With an atmosphere somewhat more casual than during the remainder of the year, our summer services and events will seem even more refreshing and leisurely than usual.

Our menu of summertime options is indeed varied. Attend a Kabbalat Shabbat service and feel the relaxing sense of calm and inspiration for the week just ending and that to follow. Participate in a provocative evening Talmud class with Rabbi Bolton and feel the thrill of intellectual challenge and elevation. If interested in joining our growing contingent of young professionals, please join their Shabbat dinners over the coming months. Or Zaruva, both on Shabbat and during the week, is a wonderfully pleas-

ant place to recharge your batteries.

On closer inspection, however, Jewish summertime is not just about easy living. Despite its generally relaxed mood, summer is distinguished by a religious high point that belies the carefree impression of this season. If you attend nothing else this summer, please make the effort to attend our spiritually measured Tish'ah B'Av service, which crystallizes the meaningfulness and complexity of each Jewish summer season.

Tish'ah B'Av is a religious milestone preceded by several weeks of spiritual preparation and followed by even more weeks of spiritual recovery. Despite the annual focus on the High Holy Days, there is certainly no temporal vacuum between Shavuot and Rosh Hashanah, for Tish'ah B'Av is a pivot around which—astonishingly to those not paying attention at this time of the year—approximately 20% of the Jewish calendar revolves.

During the summer, unlike the rest of the year, the weekly Shabbat haftarah is not linked to the Torah portion by a common theme. In advance of Tish'ah B'Av, leading up to the commemoration of the destruction of the two Temples and other calamities, come three weeks of prophetic readings of admonition warning us of the consequences of sin (*"t'lata d'puranuta"*). Subsequently, in the wake of Tish'ah B'Av, following the cathartic recitation of Lamentations, come seven weeks of consolation prophecies designed to provide a sense of comfort and redemption (*"shiv'ah d'nechemata"*). This 10-week cycle of prophetic readings imbues summertime with a rollercoaster-type array of religious emotions. Thus, while seemingly easygoing and frivolous, the summertime is actually a season of reflective Jewish solemnity.

Between the casual and serious sides of summer, from admonition to consolation, there is opportunity for contentedness and renewal. As the summer sun warms our bodies, may we join with each other at Or Zaruva to warm our souls, bringing within our synagogue building the invigorating light of summertime.

One Family by Vardi Kahana

On Sunday, May 3, the OZ Gallery hosted an exciting opening of 24 photographs by the well-known Israeli photographer Vardi Kahana. The works are on loan from the Andrea Meislin Gallery in Chelsea, which specializes in contemporary Israeli art. OZ staged a first by Skyping a live interview with the artist at the event. The connection was remarkably clear, making it feel as though she had joined us in the room.

Their over 100 descendants mirror the range of political and religious diversity in Israel today. Kahana's family dynamic represents the face of contemporary Israel and resonates as families throughout the world experience political differences and geographical separation.

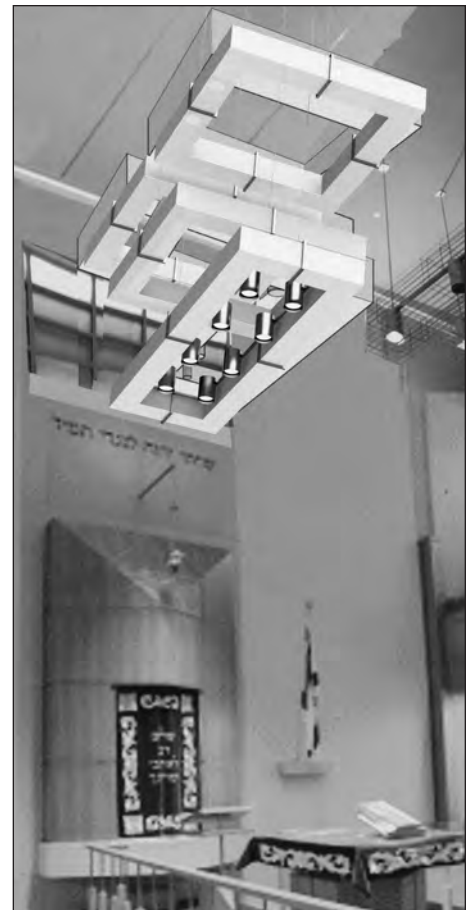

It also gave me a chance to field more extensive questions and comments from the minyanners than it is possible to address on Shabbat, when the yahrzeit is only one of a number of kiddush-related announcements.

Sanctuary Lighting Project

Or Zarua has begun a project to modernize and renovate the sanctuary lighting. The centerpiece will be a replacement (pictured) for the large central chandelier hanging above the bimah. The new fixture is being specially fabricated to our custom design, and will incorporate the latest dimming technology to control various types of eco-sensitive LED lamping. Also planned are upgrades to the existing “cage” lighting over the balconies, with every fixture treated to an overhaul that will include new housings and long-lasting LED downlights. Our goals—long in forming and looking far to the future—are to improve and enhance illumination levels while maintaining the warm feeling and clean lines that serve, elevate, and give focus to our communal worship experience.

Or Zarua's Membership Committee

The membership committee, chaired by Andrew Plevin, has been newly configured this year to include a broad range of Or Zarua constituencies. With about ten members, including Rabbi Bolton, Marc Ashley, and Helene Santo, the committee is charged with looking as broadly as possible at all aspects of membership. It will review, on an ongoing basis, membership issues that may arise over time.

The committee will review procedures for recruiting new members and determining how well those members are integrated into our community. Equally important, it

will explore how to ensure retention of current members and will develop creative strategies to market and promote OZ.

The committee met for the first time at the end of April and established several initiatives as first steps in this ongoing process.

The committee will produce a "protocol" to ensure that new members continue to be warmly welcomed and integrated into the community and check in with members who have joined over the last three years to make sure that they have had appropriate touch points with the rabbi and with other areas of the Congregation. The committee will find new

sources for prospective members, attracting new members at natural transition times when people traditionally look to join synagogues. Or Zarua already has a new and active Young Professionals group, but the membership would like to help this group continue to grow and thrive. We will look at ways to promote synagogue events with an eye toward engaging current members and attracting new members. The High Holy Days have always been central to recruitment efforts, but we hope to find new, creative ideas for marketing around the High Holy Days. Finally we will look at the dues-based model of membership relative to our funding needs.

We firmly believe that there is nothing more central to living Jewishly than educating our children and passing on to them our treasured heritage. Through a varied curriculum that includes the study of Tanakh (Bible), Jewish history, culture and values, religious life and

laws, prayer, skills for living Jewishly, Israel, and Hebrew language, we seek to instill a lifelong intellectual, emotional, and spiritual connection to Judaism.

Our modern K–12 Hebrew School—Hebrew School 2.0—combines engaging Jewish learning with science and arts, providing a unique interdisciplinary experience for our youth. Learners in grades 6–12 can participate in our B’nei Mitzvah Scholars Program or Teens@OZ, both of which provide a slate of semester-based Judaic studies courses that enable students to delve deep into our sacred texts and history. Those same learners can also participate in our two Arts and Action mini-courses, in which we use a variety of media to explore our Jewish identities while also embodying the value of tikkun olam, repairing the world,

through our work.

Outside of the classroom, Or LeAtid provides opportunities for youth and families to learn and pray together in our extensive family programs and Shabbat services, all of which enable learners to pray in authentic, age-appropriate Shabbat services, while exploring Jewish song, values, and texts with their peers.

Or LeAtid also allows youth to connect to one another through our vibrant and continuously growing Kadima (grades 6–8) and USY (grades 9–12) Youth Group Chapters. These provide youth with opportunities to learn, pray, and engage in hesed projects together, while enjoying time spent together.
