TISHA B'AV:

A Day of Grave Remembrance

Tisha B'Av (literally, the 9th of the Hebrew month of Av) commemorates the destruction of both of the ancient Temples in Jerusalem. These events are of such great impact in our spiritual history that they send shockwaves through our whole conception of time. Across the centuries, numerous other calamities have either occurred or been ascribed to this dark date. And across the annual calendar of our observances, the shadow of Tisha B'Av extends from the 17th of Tammuz three weeks

earlier—when the Roman siege of Jerusalem began in 70 C.E.—through the seven weeks of consolation following Tisha B'Av, which are marked by special haftarot, most notably Isaiah's reassurance, "Nachamu, nachamu," ("Comfort ye, comfort ye.") This period of healing leads directly to Rosh Hashanah and the High Holidays, knitting together a whole cycle of observances that recapitulates a progression from sin and destruction to repentance and restoration.

While Tisha B'Av is a day of grave remembrance for a people traditionally preoccupied with memory, it is notable that when we are commanded to remember, it is very rarely this great man-made tragedy that we are called on to remember. Rather, our memory is directed to the great God-given beginnings—the Creation and the Exodus from Egypt. And while mention of the lost temples is omnipresent in our liturgy, it is generally raised in a spirit of longing for the future re-establishment of the temple, rather than in stoking the pain of loss and victimhood. It is reassuring, in these difficult days, that our tradition requires us to remember the profound losses we have mourned, but still directs us to focus even more strongly on our yearning to heal, create, and build.

Hebrew School News Summer Preparations for Upcoming School Year

I am very excited to begin my second year as the Or Zarua Hebrew School principal. We have an expanded school schedule for the upcoming year, with added days and added classes. We are improving the Junior Congregation and the OZY services. We are hiring more teachers than in years past. We are growing into our new space.

This coming year, the second, third and fourth grade students will have a choice between the Monday and Wednesday class or the Tuesday and Thursday class.

There will be a class for the seventh grade that is geared to B'nai Mitzvah. This class should be seen as a continuation of the ethics and values courses the students began in sixth grade, and serves as a natural companion class to the private study in which our B'nai Mitzvah students engage. They will focus on different Mitzvot, and will take part in congregational Hesed projects.

Last year's middle school class, now called Bogrim, will continue their study together one evening a week, as will last year's high school class, now called Machon. These classes will continue their study of Jewish history, literature, current events and discussions on the ethical dilemmas that face Jewish teens and young adults.

Over the summer, I will be evalu-

ating last year's curriculum and upgrading it for the coming year. I am particularly interested in evaluating the progress of our students' Hebrew reading skills and their understanding of T'fillah, prayer services. We will concentrate more heavily on T'fillah next year so that the students have an easier time making the transition from the Hebrew School classroom into the sanctuary.

Next year, each grade will have the opportunity to lead a Shabbat morning service in the Shabbat class. Each student will take on the responsibility of learning a few prayers well enough to lead others in prayer. They will thus take ownership of the services, and will hopefully feel a closeness to and a familiarity with the service that they have not felt before. I hope you will support this challenge, and will encourage their at-home studies. Five minutes of Hebrew reading a night is essential to their fluent reading skills. Please be a partner in this important effort.

Watch your mail for the registration packets as they will be mailed out shortly. If you have a young child who has not entered Hebrew School before and you did not receive a Hebrew School registration packet, please contact me in the office at 452-2310, ext. 15, and I will send you continued on page 12

Solidarity Mission to Israel

About a dozen Or Zarua members participated in the Solidarity Mission to Israel sponsored by UJA-Federation of New York which departed on April 28. Staying at the King David Hotel in Jerusalem, we were addressed by and met a range of Israelis who provided first-hand insight into recent events. Perhaps most striking, indeed inspiring, was the matter-of-fact courage displayed by Israelis in carrying on daily life and in dealing with a situation probably not imaginable to most Americans, even after 9/11.

That quality was evident throughout our stay and particularly so in our visit to some of the grievouslywounded victims of terror attacks who were undergoing rehabilitation at Hadassah Hospital, including the sweetnatured sixteen year old who had not been expected to survive the serious brain injury inflicted on him during

an attack on his and his twin brother's birthday celebration on Ben Yehuda Street the night of November 30-December 1.

Israeli notables who spoke to us included Dore Gold (an advisor to Prime Minister Sharon) and Yuli Edelshtein (himself an embodiment of the miracles encountered everywhere in Israel, a former refusenik and prisoner of the Gulag, now Deputy Minister of Immigrant Absorption of the State of Israel). We listened intently as Yuli in highly fluent English, explained that Israel was now facing a situation no other democracy had ever faced and was showing that democracy can defend itself against such attack.

We travelled to Netanya for a memorial service, led by Rabbi Wechsler, at the Park Hotel, site

of the Seder night terror attack, and to Tel Aviv, where we heard the remarkable Ruth Bar-On, organizer of the Trauma Coalition, a volunteer network that brings immediate and long-term assistance to the victims of terror. Asked what message she wished us to bring back from Israel, she said,

Dr. Anna Karachkova, whose daughter was killed in the attack on the Dolphinarium disco in Tel Aviv, added, "It gives strength to us that you remember."

The message of Israel's hope and determination that we brought back from this unforgettable trip was succinctly expressed by Dr. Maravi, the head of the rehabilitation unit at Hadassah Hospital. Dr. Maravi, whose family has

lived in Jerusalem for 300 years and who said he was inspired by his patients, the victims of terror, said: "We have a good chance of winning. Our enemies invest in destruction; we invest in building. Those who invest in destruction will be destroyed; those who invest in building will survive."

Hesed Committee Highlights of the Year's Programs

The Hesed Committee scheduled several events during the past year, seeking to support those in need in our community through a range of programs and partners described below.

Rosh Hashanah Package Delivery

Last September, Or Zarua took part in Dorot's second annual East Side Rosh Hashanah package delivery. Aaron Shelden organized the Or Zarua volunteers. An agency serving the elderly, Dorot arranges for volunteers to deliver packages of holiday food and to visit with homebound seniors.

Lenox Hill Bikur Cholim

In January, 20 Or Zarua members attended an orientation to the Lenox Hill Bikur Cholim (LHBC), which supports the approximately 150 Jewish patients who are at Lenox Hill Hospital at any one particular time. In keeping with the mitzvah of Bikur Cholim, volunteers visit patients daily, including Shabbat, to provide comfort and conversation. If you are interested

Purim Donation Drive
