EMILY BRAUN SPEAKS ON Jewish Women and Their Salons

Shabbat Lunch, January 10, 2004

Professor Emily Braun will discuss "The Power of Conversation: Jewish Women and Their Salons (1780-1945)" in her presentation to fellow Congregants during Shabbat lunch on Saturday, January 10th.

The private space of the salons allowed women, generally excluded from public life, to shape and promote innovations in modern music, literature, politics and art. Dr. Braun is currently co-curating (with Emily Bilski) an exhibit on this topic for

The Jewish Museum. The exhibit, scheduled to open in February, 2005, will highlight the most influential domestic salons in Europe and America from late 18th-century Berlin to Hollywood between the World Wars.

Dr. Braun, Professor of Art History at Hunter College as well as CUNY Graduate Center, is an international authority on modern Italian art and Fascist culture. She received her Ph.D. from NYU Institute of Fine Arts and was the recipient of a Senior Research Grant from the Getty Foundation. In both 1982 and 1990 she



received the Henry Allen Moe Prize from the New York State Historical Association for the best art catalogue. *continued on page 2*

Scholar-in-Residence Rabbi Reuven Kimmelman

February 6 and 7, 2004



Rabbi Reuben Kimmelman will lead the Or Zarua community in a Shabbat of study on February 6th and 7th. Rabbi Kimmelman is an expert in the history of the prayer book and professor of Classical Judaica at Brandeis University. The theme for the weekend will be "The Distinctive"

Ideas of the Prayerbook."

With a doctorate from Yale University in Religious Studies, Professor Kimmelman has held the position of Five College Professor of Judaic Studies at Amherst College and has taught at Mount Holyoke, Smith, Trinity and Williams as well as at the Jewish Theological Seminary and Hebrew University in Jerusalem. He has also been a Senior Scholar of CLAL and has served as Scholar-in-Residence for the UJA Young Leadership Cabinet, The Wexner Heritage Foundation, the JCCA Biennial Conference and the General Assembly of UJC. He is currently Scholar-in-Residence of the JCC on the Palisades.

Rabbi Kimmelman is widely published in scholarly and popular journals covering areas of Bible, history, ethics, continued on page 3

Hebrew School life has been very busy these past few months. Students learned about the High Holidays and about the holiday of Sukkot. We were successful in fulfilling the mitzvot of decorating and learning in the sukkah, but a windstorm changed our plans for celebration and dining in the sukkah. We moved our celebration indoors to the social hall and students, teachers and parents enjoyed dancing, singing, and listening to stories.

At the end of October, we held an open house for our parents. First, I met with parents and we talked about curricula, special programs, and special events planned for the year. Then, parents met with their children's teachers for a more specific overview of the grade-level curriculum. We realized that we all have the same goals and that the children's education comes first.

At the beginning of November, on Shabbat Lech Lecha, we held a teen minyan and Shabbat lunch. We discussed the *parsha* (Torah portion of the week) and what we can learn from the *Tanach* (Bible) that we can apply to our everyday lives. The discussion continued over lunch, and as the parents came to pick up their teens they joined our conversation. We talked about Abraham's behavior in his relationship with God as compared with his behavior toward his family and others. The students enjoyed more sophisticated *drash* (interpretation) on Torah than they were familiar with from their Hebrew school experience.

As we plan for the future, we would like to expand our library and our technical capabilities. The Isaac family has generously donated video equipment that will enable us to play Israeli videos as well as domestic system videos. We are in need of a printer, a copier and scanner, preferably all in one. Also, if you have any gently used Jewish books, CDs, videos or DVDs that your family has outgrown, we will gladly accept them as donations.

TU B'SHEVAT: The Beginning of the Beginning

The old man planted a carob tree, knowing perfectly well that it would not bear fruit in what little remained of his lifetime. When his neighbor asked why, he said that he was planting for the next generation, just as previous generations had planted for him. And from this we are reminded of the precept from Pirkei Avot, "It is not your duty to finish the work, but you are not free to ignore it."

Planting a tree is an act of faith, a beginning whose end is at the distant limits of our vision. To celebrate trees in the middle of the winter is just as distant a vision. At this time of year, we are not yet experiencing the renewal of the agricultural cycle. But we know that very deeply, the trees

are emerging from dormancy and the possibility of growth is returning. It is not yet the beginning, but it is the beginning of the beginning.

Just as every achievement has a beginning, every beginning has itself a beginning—an imperceptible first movement towards a far-off goal. And such beginnings are everywhere. We have all heard of how a butterfly's wings may stir up a storm across the globe. Almost any event may be the beginning of something. Tu B'Shevat invites us to imagine the world of possibilities that may flow from our smallest acts in the cold, dark winter. Tu B'Shevat, the New Year of the Trees, occurs this year on February 7, 2004.

chat, Shtayim, Shalosh, Tayshah, Esser!" My two-year-old counts in Hebrew the same way she counts in English: with great enthu-

siasm! Hebrew numbers, parts of the body and names of animals are just some of the content explored through music and games by the newest and youngest group of Or Zarua students, the toddlers of the Calanit program.

Calanit is named for a beautiful, protected, dark-red Israeli wild flower which grows in the spring after the winter rain. Many pre-

schools in Israel are named after flowers. Our Calanit program is run by Tania Goldreich, an experienced early-childhood educator who developed the original Or Zarua Shabbat class for the under-five age group. In the classes I observed, she led the children as they sang about Old MacDonald's friend "Dod (Uncle) Moshe" and did the Hokey Pokey in Hebrew, very gradually adding new words to their growing vocabulary.

She taught them about Hanukkah through art and music and rounded off each class with a snack preceded by the appropriate *brachot*.

We are very excited that Calanit will continue this winter.
Classes will be held on Wednesday mornings from 10:30-11:20, from January 14th through March 31st. Children must be between 18 and 36 months old to partic-

February 29, 2004 Second Annual Or Zarua Blood Drive

ast year, Or Zarua's first annual Blood Drive was a fantastic success, with almost 40 pints collected! This year our goal is to do even better, collecting at least 50 pints and doubling our registrations for the national Bone Marrow Donor Registry. Or Zarua's second annual Blood Drive will be held at the synagogue on Sunday, February 29, 2004 from 9:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m., following morning minyan. Activities will be offered for children while their parents donate, including making sandwiches for distribution to the homeless. Refreshments also will be provided.

Many people ask why blood donation is so important. Here are a few facts:

- 9 in 10 people need a blood transfusion at some point in their lives.
- 1 in 10 hospital patients need a transfusion—an average of 3 pints!
- One donated pint is often broken into blood components and can be used to help many different people.
- Donated blood is used to help

patients with a wide variety of conditions and is critical to patients who need surgery.

Who can give? Just about everyone who is at least 17 years old and weighs at least 110 pounds can be a blood donor. (If you are over 75, bring a letter from your doctor.) If you have spent a significant amount of time overseas in the past few years, you may want to double check before making an appointment. Otherwise, it is very likely that you can be a donor.

As in last year's Blood Drive, you can choose to register in the Bone Marrow Donor Registry of the National Marrow Donor Program, a national network of medical organizations that identifies potential bone marrow donors around the country and matches donors with patients who might be treated with a bone marrow transplant. While the odds of matching are low, many patients are successfully treated for leukemia and other diseases with bone marrow transplants. Jews in particular are

needed as potential donors because of the likelihood that they will be a close match for other Jews with similar ancestry. Registering requires a simple blood test and takes just a few minutes, so even if you do not wish to donate blood, please consider participating in the Bone Marrow Donor Registry.

This year we are seeking at least 65 potential donors in order to reach our goal of 50 pints collected. Please sign up and bring your friends and family members to donate as well. For more information or to make an appointment to donate, or if you would like to help at this important event (you don't have to donate to volunteer!) please contact James Rothman at 212-472-1739 or jarothman@yahoo.com.

Although the collection of blood is free, each bone marrow registry costs about \$25. Please consider making a donation to Or Zarua's Hesed Fund to support this effort and other programs that help our community.

Clean Out Your Bathroom Cabinets!

You know those little bottles of shampoo and lotion that you can't resist taking home from hotels (admit it, you've saved a few)? Well, it's time to part with your mini-bottle stash!
