

Rabbi David Golinkin, Scholar-in-Residence November 5 and 6, 2004



On November 5 and 6, Rabbi Professor David Golinkin will join us for a Shabbat of study on the theme of

Conservative Halakhah in Israel Today.

At dinner following Friday night services, Rabbi Golinkin will discuss How Are These Responsa Different from All Other Responsa? The Responsa of the Vaad Halacha of the Rabbinical Assembly of Israel. During Saturday morning services, the rabbi's topic will be The Struggle on Behalf of Agunot in Israel Today. At lunch following Saturday morning services, the topic will be **The Redemption of Captives: How Far Should Israel Go?**

A major rabbinic scholar, Rabbi David Golinkin is former Dean of the Rabbinical School at the Schechter Institute of Jewish Studies in Jerusalem. He is currently Professor of Jewish Law at the institute and has served as its president since July, 2000. Rabbi Golinkin is also chairman of the Jewish Law Committee of the Rabbinical Assembly of Israel, which writes responsa and gives halakhic guidance to the Masorti (Conservative) Movement, and he is Director of the Schechter Institute's Center for Women in Jewish Law, whose goal is to find halakhic solutions for agunot ("chained women") who are unable to

obtain a get from their husbands.

Rabbi Golinkin is the author and editor of eighteen books and over one hundred forty articles, responsa and sermons. Central themes of the rabbi's work have been questions of women and Jewish law, Jewish medical ethics, Shabbat, the State of Israel, Jerusalem, and prayer. Rabbi Golinkin has offered new interpretations showing how Jewish law can be observed in contemporary society.

HANUKKAH WITH THE ANDY STATMAN TRIO



e are pleased to announce that the Andy Statman Trio will be performing at Or Zarua on Saturday evening,

December 11. Those of you who heard Chaim Dovid last year know that he transformed the sanctuary. The Andy Statman Trio, with Jim Whitney on bass and Larry Eagle on percussion, is certain to do the same.

Virtuoso Andy Statman has worn many hats—he has collaborated with everyone from Itzhak Perlman to David Grisman to Bob Dylan. You might first have heard him as a wizard on the mandolin during the "newgrass" movement. He went on to master the clarinet as a protege of klezmer clarinetist David Tarras and to become a driving force in the resurgence of klezmer, hailed as "the John Coltrane of klezmer" for his jazz improvisations.

But anyone wondering whether he will be playing bluegrass or klezmer on December 11 will be in for a surprise, because his music has evolved to encompass these and many more genres: niggunim, blues, jazz, world music. He has gone back to the

Elliot Rapaport: "I think blowing the shofar in the park was really fun."

On January 23, 2005, we will discuss the well-received new novel, *The Liberated Bride*, by the Israeli author A. B. Yehoshua.


How do you pick books to read?

OUR PRECIOUS LEGACY: Treasured Objects from Or Zarua Families Exhibition Premiers December 16

Nome and hear Hazzan Julius Goldberg chant Kol Nidre and other Jewish melodies-such was the enticement of the Yiddish-language poster displayed in Rochester, New York, over eighty years ago. One huge pair of tailor's scissors and a set of well-worn tefillin, used by the Jewish tailor in Russia who cut cloth for the czar's army uniforms a hundred years ago. An original deed for "one square foot of land for the first seat on the left side of the Western Wall in the synagogue in Revere, Massachusetts," dated July, 1928. A kiddush cup, a spice box, and havdalah candleholders-items given as gifts for the fiftieth wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Bober in 1918. Treasured items all, and but a few of the items donated by twenty-four Or Zarua

families for exhibition when "Our Precious Legacy: Treasured Objects from Or Zarua Families" goes on display in the synagogue's social hall beginning December 16, 2004.

From religious objects to the worlds of music and art to sepia-toned photographs to legal documents, these items are priceless to our Congregation. Many of the artifacts are linked with meaningful events in the lives of our ancestors.

The 1920s poster for Julius Goldberg advertises the talents of Or Zarua member Susan Kopelowitz's grandfather. The pair of scissors was a tool of the trade for Richard Stadin's grandfather. The deed was purchased by Marilyn Shapiro's grandfather, who was the synagogue's builder. The anniversary gifts were presented to the great-grandparents of Herb Lukashok.

Under the leadership of Dr. Bobbi Coller, volunteer committee members have interviewed the donors to learn the history of the articles and how they arrived in our community. These family histories will be an integral part of the presentation.

The exhibition coincides with the three hundred fiftieth anniversary celebration of the first Jewish settlers' arrival in America. Accordingly, the committee has planned a lecture at a Shabbat dinner on February 11, 2005, by a specialist in American Jewish history and immigration. "Our Precious Legacy: Treasured Objects From Or Zarua Families" will beautify our synagogue's social hall throughout the winter.

HANUKKAH: EIGHT DAYS, ONE PEOPLE

What better way to celebrate a big event than to keep on celebrating? We often extend the joy of a wedding with sheva-brachot dinners; on Hanukkah we light candles and more candles, creating more and more light each day. The rededication of the Temple in 165 B.C.E. after its desecration by the Syrians was an event that surely merits such an abundance of festivity.

One of the only other events to rival the celebration of the rededication was the original dedication of the Tabernacle, our ancestors' mobile Temple in the wilderness, when each of the twelve tribes took a day to By Ron Meyers

present a lavish array of gifts. We read of that dedication throughout Hanukkah, starting each day's reading, in the playful mood of the holiday, with the corresponding day in the Tabernacle story.

But there is a serious core to the levity of Hanukkah, which is underscored by this reading. The twelve days of dedication were a moment of uncommon unity amongst the twelve tribes, much as the reclaimed Temple of Hanukkah was a center of Jewish unity amid the threat of dispersion and exile. *Hinei ma-tov u-ma naim*, *shevet achim gam yachad*. How fine and pleasant it is for brothers and sisters to come together in harmony. That really is something to celebrate.

We light the first candle this year on December 7 at the right-hand end of the menorah, placing our candles each night from right to left, and lighting them from left to right.
