

THE HIGH HOLY DAYS: Leader, Community and Individual By Ron Meyers

The High Holy Days appear on the horizon of the calendar just as we are reaching the last parashiot of Bamidbar, the book of Numbers, the story of our wanderings in the wilderness. Neither enslaved nor yet quite free, the nation struggles to develop leadership, to function as a community, and to discover how individuals can serve the community.

At each of these levels, Bamidbar recounts success and failure. We see Moses's heroic, but fraught, labors of leadership. We see the individual moral powers of Caleb, standing apart from the spies in his optimism; of Pinchas, rushing forward to right a wrong; and of Eldad and Medad, uttering words of prophecy—impressive, but none wholly successful or beyond controversy. Finally, a new generation grows and comes together as a community to fight the battles that will forge its future.

At the Holy Days, we reflect on our continued wanderings, and we do so at each of these levels. We rely on the leadership of the hazan, though in the Hineni prayer he questions his worthiness. We speak as a community in confession, in yearning and in trepidation. And we each remain responsible, and empowered, to make our own amends. How much sharper the feelings in this season of democracy, when we bear the individual burden of advancing the community by selecting its leaders.

As we gather on the Holy Days to recall the year past, we remember that individual, community and leader are inseparable. We are all responsible, and each able, to build a new and a better year.

I t was a year ago that I came to Or Zarua, with excitement and a little bit of fear. Now I can say that the past year was a great year for me. I found among the Congregants a community of individuals who opened their hearts to me. When I walk with the kids into the sanctuary toward the end of the Shabbat service, I feel welcomed and part of a family. I am surrounded by the Hebrew School children's parents, who are ready to help with holiday celebrations and with many other activities around the school.

Now let me tell you about our preparations and plans for the new school year:

■ We painted the classrooms with beautiful child-friendly colors. During long winter afternoons, these colors will bring light into the kids' hearts.

■ We hired new teachers who will be great additions to our school.

■ We presented the curricula to the Board of Trustees.

■ The sixth grade will participate

in a special program, "The Jewish Lens: Exploring Values and Community Through Photography," based on the photography of Zion Ozeri.

■ I also developed some new programs for the Middle and High School curricula. We will study the different communities that immigrated to Israel. We will visit various New York City communities and their synagogues. We will invite Congregants whose origins are from the countries we are studying to speak with their children. We will arrange for students to volunteer once every two months in a homeless shelter or in a retirement home. I want the students to learn and realize that we are responsible for each other and for our community as a whole.

She will introduce the holidays, Shabbat, Israel, and some Hebrew vocabulary through music, games, art, and stories. Cassette tapes of the songs and vocabulary used in class will be given to pupils to share with their parents.

BOOKS FOR ISRAEL DRIVE STARTS SEPTEMBER 1 WITH NEW PARTNER SCHOOL

The Books for Israel Drive held last year was a great success, so the Hesed Committee was delighted to learn that Or Zarua has been partnered with a school new to the Books for Israel Project—the High School for Environmental Studies, located in Midreshet Ben-Gurion, a small but vibrant desert community south of Beersheva in the Negev. The school has both local students and students from across Israel who board at the school.

According to our teacher liaison at the school: "The High School for Environmental Studies is the Israeli flagship school in this field. All students are required to take part in the four-year environmental studies program, which includes ecology, geology, geography, botany, zoology, archeology, ethnic studies and more. The highlight of the curriculum is the field workshops, which take pupils out of the classroom for onsite learning experiences.

English as a Foreign Language is a mandatory subject for all pupils and they sit for matriculation examinations in this subject. In our school, we do our utmost to discuss and read about environmental issues during English lessons. Extensive reading is also an integral part of the EFL curriculum and students are required to read library books and keep reading files.

Unfortunately, due to severe budget cuts, there are no funds for purchasing new titles and our English section in the school library is guite limited. We are in need of up-to-date and interesting novels as well as reference books for project work. Our present offerings aren't too exciting and they are limited. The students do not have access to other libraries. Since we are a remote community, we have virtually no access to a large city library and the pupils are totally dependent on local facilities for all their needs. I sincerely look forward to joining Books for Israel and hope both sides will gain from this partnership."






