Uncertainties of the Spring Season

The spring season is framed in the Jewish calendar by the great festivals of Pesah and Shavuot, which commemorate the foundational events of the Exodus from Egypt and the giving of the Torah at Sinai. But in between these two great

moments, what are we to do with ourselves? We count the omer, waiting for Shavuot to arrive.

Entering a new chapter of history has its burdens. For the Israelites fresh out of Egypt, sudden freedom was sudden uncertainty. And just when they received the first set of laws that would give shape to their new society, Moses disappeared up to the mountain and the Israelites did not know whether to wait for him or to abandon hope. Jostled from uncertainty to uncertainty, they sought solace in the golden calf.

In the agricultural cycle, we know what our ancestors at Sinai did not know: how long we have to wait. But uncertainty

remains: there is no guarantee that the crops will come out well; you can't rest easy until the fruit is picked; and the barley takes seven weeks to ripen. We channel the tension of anticipation by counting the days, 50 in all, from Pesah to Shavuot.

Shavuot is the long-awaited goal, both in the soil and in the spirit. The Israelites stayed up all night on their last night in Egypt, ready at any moment to flee into the unknown wilderness while taking care to avoid the angel of death. When we stay up studying on tikkun leyl Shavuot, the tension is all unwound. We stay up freely, reveling in the Torah, the gift that transformed our freedom from a burden into a blessing.

n Sunday evening, May 22 at 7:30 p.m., we will discuss Heir to the Glimmering World by Cynthia Ozick. Author and Or Zarua Congregant Johanna Kaplan will lead our discussion of Ozick's novel, in which Rose Meadows, an orphan from upstate New York, lands in the far reaches of the Bronx as part nanny, part secretary to Professor Mitwisser and his family, German refugees who arrived in 1933.

As reviewed in *The New Yorker*, "Ozick portrays this ramshackle household to dazzling effect, as it adjusts to its many states of exile—from a sense of security, from cherished ideas, and from the consolations of each other."

On Sunday evening, June 26 at 7:30 p.m., we will look at Philip Roth's latest novel, *The Plot Against America*,

with Laura Resnikoff as discussion leader. Roth imagines what living with his family in Newark would have been like had Franklin Roosevelt lost his bid for re-election in 1940 to an isolationist hero-candidate who was sympathetic to Germany. Frank Rich in *The New York Times* wrote, "The book is riveting from the very first sentence: 'Fear presides over these memoirs, a perpetual fear.'" *The New Yorker* praised the book as a fable, "sinuous and brilliant... with its extreme sweetness (new in

Roth), its black pain, and its low ceaseless cackle."

Congregants and their guests are most welcome to join us on May 22 and June 26 to discuss these well-received novels by two outstanding authors of our times. Megillat Hashoah tells the story of the Shoah in brief but powerful passages and provides us with an appropriate liturgical foundation for memorializing these terrible events each year in our Yom Hashoah services.
