TISHE'AH B'AV: Looking Back and Looking Ahead

Isn't it curious that we have no holiday for the day our ancestors entered into the Promised Land? Passover commemorates the beginning of our journey there, and Shavuot commemorates the climactic experience of the Revelation. But the Torah was given while we were still wandering in the desert, far from reaching the place or building the society that the Torah envisions for us.

This thought arises as we approach Tishe'ah B'Av—the ninth day of the month of Av, on which both Temples were destroyed, the first in 586 BCE and the second in 70 CE. On Tishe'ah B'Av, August 3 this year, we recall the loss of the focal point in Jewish life, the geographic point of connection between Israel and God. It is the most tragic day of our year, colored in tones of grief and misery far

darker than the tones of existential solemnity on Yom Kippur. We have no holiday for coming into the land, yet we have this holiday to recall being cast out of the land.

It is a sad fact of human perception, perhaps, that we recognize what we have lost more powerfully than we notice what we have gained. But it is also in our nature to be motivated strongly by what lies ahead. Moses left this earth not by entering the Promised Land but by peering out over it, looking ahead to what his people would attain. In recalling the loss of the Temples, we join Moses in looking ahead to the goal of a people united, within itself, and with God.

Our 14th year of Congregant-led book discussions introduced this wonderful selection of titles:

- As part of our Light is Sown celebration last December, photographer Zion Ozeri discussed his recently published book, *The Jews of Yemen: The Last Generation*, and shared his own family's experience making aliyah from Yemen.
- OZ librarian Barry Feldman led our discussion of Outwitting History: The Amazing Adventure of a Man Who Rescued a Million Yiddish Books, Aaron Lansky's highly acclaimed and humorous story of how he founded the National Yiddish Book Center.
- Herb Lukashok delved into A Tale of Love and Darkness, Amos Oz's emotionally charged memoir of growing up in Israel.
- Pat Davidson presented ideas on *The Radetsky March*, Joseph Roth's 1932 novel of the demise of European ideals.
- Martha Mendelsohn focused on Welcome to Heavenly Heights, Risa Miller's contemporary novel set in a religious community outside Jerusalem.
- World War II veteran Alvin Lukashok recalled his experiences in discussing Soldiers and Slaves: American POWs Trapped by the Nazi's Final Gamble, a haunting report by Roger Cohen on American victims of Nazi slave labor in 1945.
- Dr. Barry Coller examined the highly readable biography, *Maimonides*, by Sherwin Nuland.
- Israeli mystery writer Batya Gur's Murder Duet: A Musical Case rounded out our season.

OZ Members Attend World Zionist Congress

Congregation Or Zarua congratulates
Rabbi Robert Golub and his son
Chanan—they were elected as MERCAZ
USA delegates to last month's World
Zionist Congress. They were among 145
American representatives who traveled
to Israel for the quadrennial event.

This 35th Congress marked 109 years since Theodore Herzl, founder of the modern Zionist movement, gathered 200 Jewish leaders from around the world for a meeting in Basel, Switzerland to discuss the condition of the Jewish people. The meeting yielded the World Zionist Organization, which led the campaign to establish the State of Israel.

Rabbi Golub and his wife, Judith

Rubin Golub, have lived on the Upper East Side for the past five years. Chanan, a recent graduate of The George Washington University, is an auditor at PriceWaterhouseCoopers. Rabbi Golub is the Executive Director of MERCAZ USA.

MERCAZ USA is the Zionist organization of the Conservative movement. It is the voice of Conservative Jewry within the World Zionist Organization, the Jewish Agency for Israel, the American Zionist Movement, and the Jewish National Fund. Founded nearly 30 years ago, MERCAZ's mission is both to support religious pluralism in Israel and to strengthen the connection between Israel and the Diaspora.

RABBI DAVID SILBER: Hagar and Ishmael



Rabbi David Silber will speak on Wednesday, September 13 at 8:00 p.m. in the OZ library. He will discuss the Torah reading for the first day of Rosh Hashanah, focusing on Hagar and Ishmael.

Rabbi Silber is the founder and dean of Drisha Institute for Jewish Education, which provides advanced studies for women. He compared the exclusion of women from certain posts to the segregation that kept

black athletes out of certain team positions. He feels that "the women's movement can allow Torah to speak with a louder voice to the entire Jewish community."





New Books in the OZ Library


