RUTH WISSE TO DELIVER THE LUCY DAWIDOWICZ LECTURE

Professor Ruth R. Wisse will deliver the Lucy Dawidowicz Lecture at Congregation Or Zarua on Wednesday, February 6 at 8:00 p.m. Professor Wisse is the Martin Peretz Professor of Yiddish Literature and Professor of Comparative Literature at Harvard University.

Formerly a professor of Yiddish and English Literature at McGill University, Professor Wisse held an endowed chair

in Jewish Studies. She has written a number of books, including A Little Love in Big Manhattan, The Schlemiel as Modern Hero, and I.L. Peretz and the Makings of Modern Jewish Culture. Her edited works include The Penguin Book of Modern Yiddish Verse (with Irving Howe), The Best of Sholem Aleichem, and The I.L. Peretz Reader. She is the president of the Association for Jewish Studies at Harvard and the senior editor of The Library of Yiddish Classics. Her newest publication, Jews and Power, will be the focus of the Or Zarua book discussion on Sunday, February 25 (see page 4).

Professor Wisse delivered one of Or Zarua's first Lucy Dawidowicz Lectures and is back by popular demand.

MITZVAH PROJECT

n Thursday, January 10, at 6:30 p.m. Areyvut staff will be at Or Zarua to meet with students and parents to discuss each student's personal interests and the development of a mitzvah project. Areyvut is a non-profit organization that seeks to empower Jewish youth by encouraging them to participate in community service projects. These projects help teach students the core Jewish values of hesed (kindness), tzedakah (charity) and tikkun olam (social justice). Areyvut personnel also work individually with Bnai Mitzvah families to plan mitzvah projects as well as with rabbis and educators within the community.

Understanding that everyone is unique, Areyvut works one-on-one with students to design and implement projects that cater to their individual interests and needs. One of the central aspects of Areyvut's Bnai Mitzvah program is helping students and families enhance their celebrations through social action.

COLLAGE FOR ISRAEL

The youth department is planning to display a great collage in the social

hall in honor of Israel's 60th birthday. The collage will consist of eight sections, each one telling the story of ten years in the life of Israel. Class I: Kindergarten (ages 4-5)



OH, NO! I JUST BROKE A PLATE...

Broken dishes, pottery, or clay flowerpots can serve a purpose to the OZ community. They can become sherblakh—shards of pottery customarily used to cover the eyes and mouth of a met or metah (deceased man or woman) in preparation for burial. There are several interpretations of this custom, which the Or Zarua Hevra Kadisha follows. One is an acknowledgement that we are but dust. Another is that the shards on the eyes will prevent the deceased from seeing any ill that those still living might perform, while the shard on the mouth will prevent the deceased from speaking ill of anyone in the next world.

Our sherblakh container is located in the 5th floor hallway opposite the synagogue office.

Please join us in the Or Zarua library on the fourth floor for our January and February book discussions.

On Sunday, January 13 at 7:30 p.m., as an entrée to the upcoming exhibit in the Or Zarua social hall about Yiddish theater in the early twentieth century and the Jewish immigrant experience on the Lower East Side, we will discuss Amy

Bloom's new novel, Away, an epic, emotionally charged story of young Lillian Leyb. After a pogrom destroys her family, Lillian comes to America alone, determined to make her way. When word comes that her daughter might also have survived, Lillian embarks on an astonishing journey from the Yiddish theater on Second Avenue to Seattle's Jazz District, then to Alaska, and toward Siberia.

Ron Charles wrote in *The Washington*Post, "This whole novel reads like dry wood bursting into flame: desperate and impassioned, erotic and moving—absolutely hypnotic....[W]hat begins as a paean to the immigrant spirit in a city of millions is ultimately a gasp of wonder at the persistence of love, even in the remotest spot on earth. Hang on."

On February 24 at 7:30 p.m., we will discuss *Jews and Power* by Ruth R. Wisse, Professor of Yiddish and Comparative Literature at Harvard University.

Traditionally, Jews have believed that we have a covenant with God, the most powerful force in the universe; in time, this faith engendered a belief that, unburdened by a military force, Jews could pursue a religious mission on a purely moral plain. Wisse demonstrates how Jewish political weakness increased our vulnerability to scapegoating and violence. In the context of Jewish history from the kingdom of David to the Oslo accords,

Professor Wisse presents a new way to think about the Jewish relationship to power that offers apt lessons for today's politics. Bestselling author Michael Oren writes, "In an era of deepening political and moral confusion, Ruth Wisse supplies a voice that is both clarion and courageous."

Professor Wisse will deliver the Lucy Dawidowicz Lecture at Or Zarua on Wednesday, February 6 at 8:00 p.m. (see page 1).

From the Or Zarua Librarian

Inspired by the curatorial skills of Bobbi Coller, other Congregants have joined her to develop an exhibit on the rise of Yiddish theater in New York City. The comedic antics, melodramatic performances, and artistic classical interpretations of the art theaters may be long past, but those vibrant productions will echo again in Or Zarua's social hall when the exhibit opens on Sunday, January 27.

To enhance your appreciation of the exhibit, the following bibliography offers a general introduction to Yiddish theater and the early period of Jewish settlement on the Lower East Side, which supported the theater. I have included some lesser known sources that will require a trip to the Jewish Division at the New York Public Library or JTS. These are not easily

available and require strong interest and commitment. Devotees of this theatrical genre can also listen to digitalized CDs, which are scratchy but passable.

Tu B'Shevat: The Celebration of Small Things

Tu B'Shevat is a little holiday. But we make a virtue of celebrating little things. We've only just finished celebrating Hanukkah and the miracle of the little bit of oil lasting for eight days. We have enshrined in our liturgy the miracle that in our ancestors' rebellion against foreign rulers, the strong were delivered into the hands of the weak, the many into the hands of the few.

The Jewish people has always been the little nation, the few amid the many. It was with only seventy people that Jacob descended into Egypt, but, as God had promised, that small clan grew into a multitude. God promised Abraham that he would give rise to a great nation when his family was at its smallest point—when Ishmael was banished and Isaac not yet conceived. This must have felt to Abraham like his darkest hour, but in fact the deepest darkness had already passed, as God had the future mapped out for him.

At Tu B'Shevat, the darkest days of winter are just, imperceptibly, passed,

and as the sap begins to run in the trees, the future begins to come into view. We make the most of the hint of what is to come, so that we can orient ourselves to bringing it to pass. So it is in the big picture of history—we speak of the re-establishment of the State of Israel as *reishit tsmichat g'ulateinu*, the first glimmer of our salvation, even if much work remains to bring that salvation to full fruition. And so it is that we celebrate the sweep of the changing seasons, at the first glimmer of the new cycle of life.

Arnold M. Eisen, Chancellor of The Jewish Theological Seminary (JTS) and a foremost expert on American Judaism, will be guest speaker at Congregation Or Zarua at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, March 12.

Chancellor Eisen, who officially assumed his position at JTS last July, will discuss "Conservative Judaism: A Vision." A reception will follow his presentation.

The Chancellor has worked closely for the past 20 years with synagogue and federation leadership around the country to analyze and address the issues of Jewish identity, the revitalization of Jewish tradition, and the redefinition of the American Jewish community.

A product of the Conservative Movement, Chancellor Eisen has served as a faculty member of the Wexner Heritage Program, the Wexner Fellowship, and the Nahum Goldmann Fellowship of the Memorial Foundation for Jewish Culture. He is also on the Board of Governors of the Jewish Agency and has long been known as a passionate advocate of strengthening the connection between American Jews and Israel.

Chancellor Eisen's publications include a personal essay, Taking Hold of Torah: Jewish Commitment and Community in America (1997); an historical work, Rethinking Modern Judaism: Ritual, Commandment, Community (1998); and The Jew Within: Self, Family and Community in America (2000), coauthored with sociologist Steven M. Cohen. He is currently at work on a book that probes new possibilities for the meaning of Zionism.

He received a Ph.D. in the history of Jewish thought from Hebrew University; a B.Phil. in the sociology of religion at Oxford University; and a B.A. in religious thought from the University of Pennsylvania. Before assuming his role as Chancellor, he was the Koshland Professor of Jewish Culture and Religion at Stanford University. He previously served as senior lecturer in the Department of Jewish Philosophy at Tel Aviv University, and assistant professor in the Department of Religion at Columbia University.

Chancellor Eisen is married to Dr. Adriane Leveen, a scholar of Hebrew Bible, and has two children, Shulie and Nathaniel.
