wenty-four Congregation Or Zarua Hebrew School students traveled to the recording studios of Sirius XM Satellite Radio on Monday, May 17, accompanied by Ilana Burgess, the school principal, and Rob Silverbush, their music teacher. There they met up with Rabbi Wechsler and Danny Labin, executive producer of Shalom Sesame, the Jewish version of Sesame Street, to participate in the recording of the weekly Sunday radio broadcast of "Rabbi Wechsler Teaches," which aired on Sunday, May 30.

The "family content" was specifically targeted for the Sunday of the Memorial Day weekend as people all over America would be in their cars and have a chance to listen to Sirius XM.

This May 30 segment of "Rabbi Wechsler Teaches" focused on the education of children. In the first part of the program, Rabbi Wechsler spoke about the meaning of Memorial Day. He then interviewed Mr. Labin to explore his thoughts on education and children. Following the interview, Rob Silverbush led the student group in singing Hebrew songs.

Next the children had an opportunity to pose questions to Rabbi Wechsler during a round of "Ask The Rabbi." He was able to tell the story of the Italian Torah that is under Or Zarua's care, which was used during World War II and traveled with American troops in the European theater. The Torah was then under the care of an Army Air Force clergyman who also happened to be a parachutist. You can imagine the rest of the story!

Ilana discussed the unique role played by a Hebrew School education in the life of Jewish children. Ilana told a story about a giant who banished the neighborhood children from his beautiful garden. When the children stopped coming to play in the garden, all the plants wilted and the garden died. Rabbi Wechsler asked the students what they learned from the story and Or Zarua's clever students answered that:

Kids bring things to life.

Children are the future,

Children give happiness to the world.

The students of Or Zarua's Hebrew School were very impressed by this special event and thank everyone who worked so hard to make it happen.

ver the next few weeks, we will be updating our membership database. Some of our records are old and inaccurate and, as we move towards more electronic communication, we want to "clean up" each member's information. Items like email addresses will become increasingly important as most of our communication will become internet-based. This will not only help the environment (as we produce less paper mailers, flyers, etc.) but will also save us considerable dollars in printing and mailing costs.

To this end, we have mailed each membership unit (one per household) a tri-fold Survey Update Form. Each form is "household specific" and displays all the relevant information we have about your membership unit in our electronic files. Names, addresses, phone numbers, dates of birth, anniversary, b'nai mitzvah, yahrzeits, etc. are shown as they now appear in our records. Please make sure

you received your copy; if you haven't, call the office immediately for a replacement.

We ask you to review all the information for accuracy and completeness. If it is correct, check the appropriate box (No Changes Needed) and return the form to us. If, however, changes are necessary, please update the information in the spaces provided and return the form to us. For ease of reply, the form becomes a "self-mailer" and you may mail, fax, scan or email the form back to us, whichever is your preference. A return rate of 100% is our goal as we hope to make our records as accurate as possible. If your form is not received by the due date, we will assume our records to be correct and will not make any additions or corrections to your account.

Just as this is a census year, so too is it a year when we can update our membership records. Your help in this regard is not just appreciated, but required. Thank you in advance for your cooperation.

Nobody Likes to Think About Dying

The wisdom of pre-planning and pre-paying funeral and burial costs

obody likes to think (much less talk) about dying. Yet it is an inexorable part of living. As you are aware, Or Zarua is blessed with an active and compassionate volunteer group known as Hevra Kadisha (literally, Holy Friends), who assist and perform many of the proscribed final rites for the deceased and the family.

One thing they cannot do is help a family plan for this eventuality. Nowadays, many families have the forethought and inclination to pre-plan and pre-pay their funeral and burial costs, thereby eliminating those decisions from the surviving family members at a time that is already extremely stressful.

Or Zarua had the foresight nearly five years ago to purchase and develop a beautiful memorial park for its members and families at Beth El Cemetery, Washington, New Jersey, about 10 miles from of the George Washington Bridge (right near Paramus). The property is now fully landscaped as befits the aesthetics of our building and the values of Congregation Or Zarua members. Walkways and shrubbery beautify the grounds and offer a serene, tranquil final resting place for our loved ones. Each family may select their own headstone(s) with all graves uniformly covered with grass.

Many members took advantage of the initial offering in October 2006 by purchasing gravesites for themselves and other family members, but there are still many sites available. The Or Zarua member price is \$1,400 per gravesite (contrasted with the open market price at Beth El of \$2,000 to \$3,500 per site, depending upon site location).

Please note that we are holding this \$1,400 price until September 1, 2010, at which time the cost per gravesite will rise to \$2,000. So as to ensure long-term care and maintenance of each gravesite, it is required that each family purchase "Perpetual Care" directly from the cemetery (approximately \$3,500 to \$4,000 per grave currently).

We encourage you to consider this pre-planning option. Should you have





questions, need travel directions, want to see the available plot map or wish to purchase a gravesite, please contact Executive Director Harvey M. Brenner at the synagogue office or via email at hbrenner@orzarua.org

Let us hope that it is a very long time until the gravesite is needed, but a bit of pre-planning can help ensure that your wishes are honored and your family and loved ones are spared unnecessary anguish.

Emergency Defibrillation at Or Zarua

ongregation Or Zarua is a large, active community. And, as with any community, sometimes unfortunate events may occur. One of these unfortunate events is a heart attack. In order to deal with heart attacks within our synagogue community, Or Zarua has purchased and installed three automated External Defibrillators (AED) in the building.

The synagogue has also trained eleven members of our community in the use of the AED and in cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR). These trained members are able to deal with situations in which a person is not breathing, is choking or is having a heart attack, and are able to use the AED when necessary. Training was performed by Emergency Skills, Inc. according to standards set by the American Heart Association. Only people specifically trained and certified to

use an AED should administer an AED.

Used in conjunction with CPR, the AED is a small electronic device that first diagnoses arrhythmia and then delivers an electric shock to a heart to stop the arrhythmia and allow the heart the opportunity to start with a normal rhythm. People who employ an AED are trained in both CPR and the use of the AED. Or Zarua has contracted with Emergency Skills, Inc. to provide both training and to make sure that our congregation has complied with all regulations regarding the AED.

The eleven members of our congregation, a mix of congregants and OZ staff, who have been trained to use the AED are: Anthony Banfield, Harvey Brenner, Yael Goren, Jonathan Kaplan, Alan Mayer, Diane Okrent, Jay Palmer, Laura Resnikoff, Gerry Solomon, Charles Spielholz and Miriam Wallerstein. If you are trained and certified to use an AED, please bring it to

the attention of the Or Zarua office so your name may be added to the list.

The three AEDs are located in the vestibules leading to the back stairwells of the synagogue on the social hall, sanctuary and sixth floor levels. The AED on the first and sixth floors also contain special accessories for use on children.

We hope and pray that all of us continue in good health.
