am delighted to say shalom aleihem to you as we approach the New Year and prepare to celebrate Rosh Hashanah 5773 together.

When I was invited

to become the next rabbi at Congregation Or Zarua, many people had wonderful stories to share with me about the Or Zarua approach, the commitment to Jewish learning here, and the many Jewish experiences they have had at this Congregation. Before I started, I heard tales of how the community became a home for people seeking a traditional, participatory, and egalitarian synagogue on the Upper East Side. "There's an intellectual and spiritual engagement there," said one friend. "Tradition, culture, and arts all play important roles."

Of course, one way of getting to know one another is to do so at our religious services. I have been inspired on Shabbat mornings, at our morning minyanim, and especially on Friday nights. Our Kabbalat Shabbat service is an engaging way to make the transition from a busy work week to the sense of Shabbat peace that too often escapes us in our fast-paced world. With a few words of inspiration and spirited singing, the Friday night service lasts about an hour. I encourage each of you to attend the services that you find most meaningful.

During this month of Elul, I pray that each of us finds a way to prepare for the

approaching Days of Awe. We are blessed to be able to live in a time that is American, global, and Jewish. Soon we will be able to gather as one community in the sacred space that we will create in Wallace Hall, on the lower level of St. Ignatius Loyola Church, for the Yamim Noraim. We are fortunate to have gracious neighbors who are helping us make the space suitable for our Congregation during our High Holy Days. We will also have Tashlikh together and gather for afternoon and evening services in our beautiful Or Zarua synagogue. From the High Holy Days to the chag of Sukkot—I am looking forward to a sukkah on the roof—when we are reminded that joy and family time are enhanced by Jewish ritual, I eagerly anticipate celebrating with everyone.

My family and I sincerely appreciate the welcome we continue to receive as we meet members of the community and become part of this dynamic family.

President's Message

ecently at Or Zarua there has been a lot of talk about "transition." After all, we are in a "transition" year. We have a

new rabbi and a Transition Team in place to smooth the way for him and his family into the Or Zarua community. Rabbi Bolton is already deeply involved in every aspect of the Congregation, from leading services to visiting the sick to meeting with current and prospective members to playing Frisbee with young families on Shabbat afternoons in Central Park. And, of course, he is immersed in preparations for his first High Holy Days at Or Zarua.

Rabbi Bolton has already met many members and looks forward to meeting many more in the coming weeks and months. Throughout the upcoming holidays, there will be many opportunities to meet him. And we are planning "Meet the Rabbi" get-togethers in the next few months. This transition at OZ will continue.

Life itself is all about transition. We, and our circumstances, are constantly changing—evolving from one stage to another. As Gail Sheehy wrote in *Passages*, "Changes are not only possible and predictable, but to deny them is to be an accomplice to one's own unnecessary vegetation." We must change—transition, if you will—or we will stagnate. Just as each individual grows and matures physically, intellectually, and spiritually, so has Or Zarua grown and matured. We have always been in transition.

Elul, the last month in the Jewish civil calendar, is a time of transition. We are conscious of moving from our routine existence toward Rosh Hashanah. Each weekday morning, the shofar is blown and we read Psalm 27, "The Lord is my light and my help. Whom shall I fear?" The shofar blasts are intended to awaken us to search our

hearts and draw close to God in preparation for the coming Day of Judgment (Rosh Hashanah) and the Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur). We are expected to get out of the doldrums and get moving toward repentance and renewal. In the words of Maimonides, the message of the shofar is, "Awake you sleepers from your sleep, and you that are in slumber, rouse yourselves. Consider your ways, remember God, turn unto Him."

Tishri, the first month in the Jewish civil calendar, begins with Rosh Hashanah and includes Yom Kippur and Sukkot. It is an intense but wonderful month! We will usher in Tishri together with Rabbi Bolton at Erev Rosh Hashanah services on Sunday, September 16, in the Or Zarua Sanctuary. Each evening of Rosh Hashanah, we will daven together at Or Zarua (September 16, 17, and 18). Each day of Rosh Hashanah and on Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur, we will daven together at Wallace Hall—a beautiful space in our neighborhood at Park Avenue, between 83rd and 84th Streets.

Immediately after Yom Kippur, we will build our beautiful rooftop Sukkah at Or Zarua so we can fulfill the mitzvah, *lei-sheiv ba-sukkah*. We will have delicious meals together in the Sukkah.

As the summer draws to a close, we transition from a more relaxed lifestyle to a more intense work schedule, school, and the whirlwind cultural agenda that defines New York. It always seems that life begins again in September! At Or Zarua, our programming year will begin as well. Join us on September 8 for our Welcome Back Kiddush, Dessert Reception and Selihot. Between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, join us on September 19, when Rabbi David Silber will lecture on a topic related to the Days of Awe.

I look forward to greeting you soon and often during this year of transition. Please renew your membership so that you can join us for the High Holy Days.

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
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OZ Cemetery

High Holy Days 5773/2012

The same, but different, at Wallace Hall

ach year, the summer months are a busy time ■ at Or Zarua as we focus on the many details involved in planning for the High Holy Days. Last year we were fortunate to have secured space at the New York Academy of Medicine on very short notice. While the building served our needs well, and its staff was extremely accommodating and helpful, the location was inconvenient for a significant num-

ber of Congregants. Following Sukkot, we undertook an exploration of our immediate neighborhood to find a more geographically suitable High Holy Day location. Wallace Hall, the event space on the lower level of St. Ignatius Loyola Church, has been selected from the very few possibilities available.

Wallace Hall is located on the west side of Park Avenue between 83rd and 84th Streets. There are two entrances, one at the corner of 84th Street and one midway between 83rd and 84th Streets. The large, attractive space will hold all of us comfortably. Children through the age of 6 will have their services in the same building, while those ages 7–12 will have theirs in the Or Zarua building, at 127 East 82nd Street.

Evening services for Rosh Hashanah will be held at Or Zarua, 127 East 82nd Street, on Sunday, September 16, from 6:15 p.m to 7:15 p.m., and on Monday, September 17, from 6:45 p.m. to 7:45 p.m. Rosh Hashanah morning services, Monday, September 17, and Tuesday, September 18, will be at Wallace Hall from 8:30 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. Children's services will be from 10:45 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. at both locations. As usual, Tashlikh will take place on the first day of Rosh Hashanah

at the Central Park Reservoir from 5:45 p.m. to 6:15 p.m.

Minhah for Erev Yom Kippur, Tuesday, September 25, will be at Or Zarua, 127 East 82nd Street. from 1:20 pm. to 1:45 p.m. Kol Nidre that evening will take place at Wallace Hall from 6:30 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. Yom Kippur services, Wednesday, September 26, will be held at Wallace Hall beginning at 9:00 a.m. Children's services will be held from 10:45 a.m. to 12:45 p.m. at both

Wallace Hall and Or Zarua for the appropriate age-groups.

All dates, times, and locations will be printed on the reverse of each High Holy Day ticket. The seating arrangement at Wallace Hall will be according to our long-established practice—a central bimah with seating on three sides—and seats are unassigned.

Tickets have been mailed to all members in good standing. Please call the synagogue office with any questions or concerns you may have in connection with dues payment. Note that all children through the age of 22 are included in family membership. Children ages 23 and above are required to have guest tickets; any inquiries in this regard should be directed to the synagogue office as well.

So, what remains the same? While the venue has changed, the mahzor, style, and conduct of the services are as they have been. We will, as we always have done, welcome longstanding and newer Congregants to join together as a community to reflect on the year ending and to pray for a *shanah tovah*, a year of all that is good. And we will welcome Rabbi Scott Bolton, Rabbi Amy Bolton, and their children into our embrace as they share the High Holy Days with us for the first time.

ur annual study session with Rabbi David Silber will be held at 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, September 19. Presentations by Rabbi Silber, founder

and dean of the Drisha Institute for Jewish Education, have become a staple part of Or Zarua's schedule of events in connection with the High Holy Days. His lectures enrich our understanding of the High Holy Day services. Past topics have included "Yom Kippur and Purim," "The Shofar: Rejoice in Trembling," "Echoes of the Akedah," "The Redemption of Sarah," "The Book of Jonah," "The First Day of Rosh Hashanah: Hagar and Ishmael," and "The Story of Hannah."

From these past talks, we can count on an interesting and thought-provoking presentation that will enrich our understanding of a key part of the Rosh Hashanah service.

The Drisha Institute, founded in 1979, offers an advanced program of Jewish studies for women, providing women full access to classical texts of the Jewish tradition and preparing women for leadership positions in Jewish education. A number of Or Zarua members have studied at Drisha. For the past several years, Drisha has also provided increasing opportunities

trope system with understanding. I would like to increase the number of people who enjoy the Torah reading, and appreciate its aesthetic and nuances. This is something I love and have been doing for more than 50 years. I am happy to have others share the benefits of that experience in no more than ten sessions. I feel I will be honoring those who taught me, either directly or by example. Although this course has been advertised as for beginners, all levels are welcome.


Or Zarua Book Discussions

The Brothers Ashkenazi by Israel Joshua Singer, Sunday, October 28

lease join us for our next Or Zarua book discussion on Sunday, October 28, at 7:30 p.m. in Or Zarua's library. Barry Feldman, fellow Congregant and champion of Yiddish culture, will lead our discussion of this classic novel by Israel Joshua Singer, the acclaimed Yiddish author and older brother of the more famous Isaac Bashevis Singer.

I. J. Singer (1893-1944) came to the United States in 1934, and within two years The Brothers Ashkenazi was published and became a bestseller at the same time as Gone With the Wind.

He brought to Yiddish literature the multilayered plots, large casts of characters, and narrative sweep of the traditional European novel. The essayist Joseph Epstein called Brothers "the best Russian novel ever written in Yiddish."



The book depicts the contrasting careers of two brothers attempting to get ahead in Russian-ruled Lodz, Poland, in the era of rapid industrialization and urbanization. The Ashkenazi brothers dif-

fered in talent and in temperament. Max (né Simha Meir), the firstborn, is wily, driven by ambition, and greedy to be more successful financially than his brother. Jacob is strong, handsome, charming, but decadent.

The brothers and their families are torn apart by the clashing impulses of old piety and new skepticism, traditional ways and burgeoning appetites, and class and ethnic hatred. Despite their effort to control their destinies, the brothers are caught up by greater forces of history, love, and fate.

Saul Bellow praised Brothers as "a wonderful novel." The Wall Street Journal wrote: "The book has the grand sweep of Tolstoy...pitch-perfect artistry and pace." Newsweek said, "The Brothers Ashkenazi rates a place on any shelf devoted to modern works of art."

Or Zarua Receives Homeland Security Grant

To help upgrade our electronic access and security systems

his year, after several prior unsuccessful attempts to secure a Federal Homeland Security Grant (for nonprofit organizations), Congregation Or Zarua was awarded a grant that will help us upgrade our electronic access and security systems.

The Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Services (DHSES) grant system awarded a total of \$10 million around the country to nonprofit entities that were deemed important religious, social or community sites in need of hardening their facilities. In New York State alone, there were 273 applicants and only 43 recipients (of which we were one); the awards totaled some \$3,120,000 (or roughly 31% of the total federal funds available).

Over the next 12–24 months, you will see various cameras, monitoring, and access equipment upgrades to our facility that will make our premises that much more safe and secure for all our members, guests, and staff.

At the end of the upgrade, we'll have a more modern digital system, which will enable authorized personnel and law enforcement agencies to monitor and record activity in and around our facility, respond more quickly and efficiently to any incidents (in the unlikely event that there is a threat at Or Zarua), and in general better serve everyone who walks through our doors.
