ome hear fellow Congregants discuss the impact of imagination and creativity on Judaism, art, and technology. Speakers will be Rabbi Paulette Posner, director of Jewish Education at the 92nd Street Y; Dan Labovitz, a securities industry consultant and intaglio artist, whose work has been shown in New York, San Francisco, and Prague; Suzanne Spector, technology editor at *The New York Times* and a lawyer; and Rabbi Melinda Zalma, a chaplain in the Reserve Component of the U.S. Navy with a master's in Midrash.

In keeping with the revelatory nature of the holiday, we will ask our panelists to

share how creativity and imagination shape their thinking and work in their respective realms. As the boundaries between disciplines blur and change, how do scholars, artists, and technologists think about where and how to break with tradition and where to build bridges between disciplines? How can openness to new ideas and rethinking old orthodoxies move us forward, Jewishly and generally? But also, how far is too far? When should we tame our imaginations, and when should we let them run wild? Join us for an insightful exploration into the world of creativity!

President's Message

his is my

column as
president of Congregation Or Zarua. It has
been an honor and a

privilege to lead this wonderful community for the past three years. As I said at last year's Annual Meeting, I want to thank the founders of Or Zarua for their foresight in setting term limits so that no individual can hold an office for more than three years in succession. It has proven healthy for the individuals and for the organization.

We have seen many changes at the synagogue since 2011. I was elected soon after Rabbi Wechsler announced his retirement. Then, less than a month later, we learned that we could not use the Ramaz Upper School for our High Holy Day services in 2011 as we had for the previous 19 years. Three weeks after that, while the Board was meeting to vote on the decision to hold services at the New York Academy of Medicine, we learned that Kehilath Jeshurun was on fire. So my presidency started with something of a bang!

The focus of my first year was the rabbinic search and the activities surrounding the search. Two years ago, I presided at the Annual Meeting during which we voted to hire Rabbi Bolton.

During my second year as president we concentrated on the rabbinic transition—helping Rabbi Bolton adjust to Or Zarua and helping Or Zarua adjust to Rabbi Bolton. From my perspective, the transition has been a tremendous success. Rabbi Bolton has brought new energy to all aspects of Or Zarua. He has created a wonderful vibe in the shul—and buzz outside the Congregation. His enthusiasm is contagious. His warm embrace and ability to engage members of all ages are recognized and much appreciated. Services are

lively and upbeat. Adults, teens, and children are engaged, involved, and learning. Rabbi Bolton has inspired new educational opportunities for all. He initiated, and has helped expand, the East Side Torah Learning Coalition. Now comprising 11 congregations—two Orthodox, five Conservative, and four Reform—the East Side TLC is, once again, offering *Pirke Avot* classes between Pesah and Shavuot. These will continue on Thursdays through May 29. Check the calendar for times and locations.

abbi Bolton often engaged members of the community as he has reached out in times of joy and sadness. Many members have shared with me how he has brought them comfort and consolation at a time of illness or loss. And many have shared how happy they have been sharing their simchas with him. Many have remarked at how quickly he became "our rabbi."

Transition continued this past year as we hired our new executive director, Helene Santo. Helene has brought renewed energy and organization to our staff. She has tackled many of the challenges of the community and our maturing building with grace and resourcefulness.

As I leave office, I thank you, the members, for your encouragement and support. I appreciate the time, creativity, and resources so many of you bring to OZ. I want to give special thanks to the committee chairs and their members, the Executive Committee, and the Board of Trustees for all their hard work to make this a vibrant, thriving organization. I am particularly grateful to have had the opportunity to work with both Rabbi Wechsler and Rabbi Bolton to enhance what Or Zarua offers its members and the larger Jewish community.

MY PROMISED LAND: THE TRIUMPH AND TRAGEDY OF ISRAEL, BY ARI SHAVIT



lease join us for our next Or Zarua book discussion on Sunday, May 4, at 7:30 p.m. in
Or Zarua's library, when Aliza Kaplan will lead a discussion of My Promised Land:
The Triumph and Tragedy of Israel, by Ari Shavit, a New York Times bestseller and winner of the National Book Award.

The book is an authoritative and deeply personal narrative history of the State of Israel by one of the most influential journalists writing about the Middle East today.

Ari Shavit draws on interviews, historical documents, private diaries, and letters, as well as his own family's story, to illuminate the pivotal moments of Israel's development and tell a riveting narrative.

We meet Shavit's great-grandfather, a British Zionist who, in 1897, visited the Holy Land on a Thomas Cook tour and



saw that the future of his people was there; the idealistic young farmer who bought land from his Arab neighbor, in the 1920s, to grow the Jaffa oranges that would support a thriving economy; the visionary youth group leader who, in the 1940s. transformed Masada from the neglected ruins of an extremist sect into a powerful

symbol for Zionism; a young man who was expelled with his Arab family from their home in Lydda in 1948; the immigrant orphans of Europe's Holocaust, who took on menial work and focused on raising their children to become the leaders of the new state; the pragmatic engineer who was instrumental in developing

Israel's nuclear program in the 1960s, in the only interview he ever gave; the religious Zionists who started the settler movement in the 1970s; the dot-com entrepreneurs and young men and women behind Tel Aviv's booming club scene; and today's architects of Israel's foreign policy to counter Iran's nuclear threat.

As it examines the complexities and contradictions of the Israeli condition, *My Promised Land* asks difficult but important questions: Why did Israel come to be? How did it come to be? Can Israel survive? Culminating with an analysis of the issues and threats that Israel is currently facing, *My Promised Land* uses the defining events of the past to shed new light on the present.

"Israel is not a proposition, it is a country. Its facticity is one of the great accomplishments of the Jews' history....It is one of the achievements of Ari Shavit's important and powerful book to recover [that] feeling," wrote Leon Wieseltier in The New York Times Book Review.

Though He May Tarry: Messianism in Jewish Thought

AN ADULT EDUCATION COURSE BETWEEN PESAH AND SHAVUOT

he most famous of Maimonides's thirteen principles of faith posits that a Jew must await the eventual arrival of the Messiah—"though he may tarry"—whenever that day might come. Observant Jews pray for the messiah three times a day. Our holy sources are filled with persistent pleas to God to bring about the messianic redemption. Yet messianism in Jewish thought is anything but uniform and transparent.

Indeed, crucial questions persist about this pivotal Jewish idea. Does Jewish mes-

sianic yearning spring from a sense of deep despair or of vibrant hope? Will the glorious messianic era be preceded by a period of suffering and misery, and, if so, why must history work that way? And, perhaps most important as a logistical matter, how will we recognize the Messiah when we see him? Such age-old questions continue to animate contemporary Jewish life and touch the core of many Jewish hearts and hopes.

Join our discussion of these important issues in an adult education course,

led by Congregant Marc Ashley, between Pesah and Shavuot. In "Though He May Tarry: Messianism in Jewish Thought," we will examine Jewish sources and perspectives on the messiah and messianism.

We will meet in the library at 10:00 a.m. on four Sunday mornings: May 4, 18, and 25, and June 1. No prior knowledge is required. Please participate in an enduring conversation about whether, when, and why the Messiah might arrive, issues about which Jews have studied, prayed, and dreamed through the centuries.

Ceremony, Community, and Individual Clarifications

articipating in rituals goes beyond robotic rehearsals of ancient rites. In our communal engagements, we declare our

faith and intention to remember loved ones, sacred teachings, or important aspects of and connections in our lives. On an individual basis, each of us can use the group setting to find even deeper privacy and space to think. It is ironic, but it works just this way.

With rituals and ceremonies, we listen and acquiesce, yet we question and ultimately clarify. By coming together for prayer, a ceremony concerning the Holocaust, an Israel program, a memorial service, or a class with fellow Congregants, we are committing to time for mindfulness as much as we are setting ourselves into

an aesthetic experience that bespeaks sacred pursuits. We must take the opportunity in these spaces and during these times to clarify values, develop our own thinking and ask serious questions of ourselves.

The Holocaust and Israel are on our minds at this season, or we are at least thrust into grappling with their place in our lives. Yom HaShoah, Yom HaZikaron and Yom Ha'atzmaut—Holocaust Heroism and Remembrance Day, Israeli Memorial Day and Independence Day—all follow Passover. These holy days prompt us to ask: Where does a historic moment fit into our lives? How do these permanent parts of history impact us? As we remember the millions who perished, we may ask, among other questions: How was it holy and heroic to resist, either physically or mentally?

With Israel we are spurred to explore our connections. What investment are we making to encounter and develop ideas about Israel and to experience the reality on the ground?

This time period on the Jewish calendar is called Sefirah, or the Omer. We understand that God wanted us to enumerate each day in order to prepare us for a life-changing experience at Mount Sinai. Historically, Shavuot is the time when the Jewish people received the Torah. What is our relationship to the Jewish calendar? To Torah's messages? To the law and the cultural constructs of Judaism and the Jewish people?

Coming to participate in ceremonies, community programs, and times of togetherness is not only about what's on the menu. It is also a time to nourish one's mind and soul. Amazingly, the collective experiences help each of us find our truest selves. The more we are here with and for one another, the greater the blessings and more profound the discoveries.
