

Our book, The Aleppo Codex: A True Story of Obsession, Faith, and the Pursuit of an Ancient Bible by Matti Friedman, tells the amazing story of the creation, preservation, loss, and rediscovery of a crucial Biblical text. It is

A famous scribe, cited by the legendary Maimonides, wrote the Aleppo Codex in the tenth century. It was written at the same time as the Mishneh Torah and was protected for centuries in the

## President's Message

inally, spring is upon us. After a brutally protracted winter, the days are now longer, brighter, and more cheery. The world seems transformed.

Trees are blooming and pedestrians' smiles are more prevalent. New York City is glorious and welcoming once again. And at its epicenter stands Or Zarua, beckoning to us to feel the warmth and joy of springtime together as participants in a vibrant and buoyant shul community.

Each day and every year, out of darkness comes light. As we move in the Jewish calendar from Passover toward Shavuot, along the ascending path from redemption to revelation, we should take note of the changing world around us. We must rouse ourselves from our recurring complacence and inattentiveness to appreciate the regeneration of life all around us. The seasons may be predictably cyclical, but each can be enjoyed for its own special character.

Jewish tradition certainly takes note of God's grant of a revitalized world each spring. Indeed, Jewish law mandates that we pause to praise God for renewed nature that surrounds us. The annual rebirth of the natural world is not to be taken for granted, lest it be neglected.

The Shulchan Arukh, the authoritative and comprehensive 16th-century code of Jewish law authored by Rabbi Yosef Karo, prescribes a specific blessing—birkat ha-ilanot—upon our initial viewing of a blooming fruit tree each spring. The blessing, which is traceable to the Talmud and can be said once each year starting in the springtime, extols God's ongoing renewal of creation and gracious provision for us of a bountiful world. "Blessed are You, Lord our God, King of the universe, who has made nothing lacking in His world, and created in it goodly creatures and goodly trees so that people can take pleasure in them." This once-a-year mitzvah is preferably fulfilled in the presence of a group of trees and in the absence of

rain, when the abundance and awesomeness of nature are self-evident.

It is noteworthy that this extraordinary blessing over a flowering tree is said upon the tree's flowering but before the tree actually bears fruit. That is, we thank God in advance for fruit yet to come; once the fruit has ripened, the blessing may no longer be said. The blessing thus reflects the reality that spring is a time of blooming and rebirth, but it is not an end in itself. It is a period of regenerative transition and transformation, designed eventually to achieve a higher plateau, in which the world settles into a natural rhythm of warmth, beauty, and grace.

The passage from flowering tree to fruit-bearing tree sometimes takes weeks, but it is worth the wait. The longer spring lasts, the better. It is a pleasure to enjoy the enveloping comfort of spring, when all is suffused with color, while anticipating the steady warmth of summer. That annual seasonal trajectory is both reassuring and invigorating, and can inspire us to capture the splendor of the moment as we derive pleasure from the world beyond ourselves.

So, too, in the life of Or Zarua. Each year and from generation to generation, we must work hard to move beyond the cold of winter, to appreciate the transformative quality of spring, so that we can then enjoy the fruits of our labor. We must pause, individually and communally, to take account of and give thanks for what has been provided to us and for all we have achieved. The past must be honored, even as we recognize that the present is the gateway to our future. We nurture the blossoming trees that accompany the springtime, as they herald fruits to come.

To move from season to season takes effort and patience, but the sight of a newly blooming tree—or the flourishing of our synagogue community—is cause for thanksgiving and celebration. As we enjoy this seasonal bounty, may our energy, optimism and happiness abound.



abbi Judith Hauptman, the E. Billi Ivry Professor of Talmud and Rabbinic Culture at The Jewish Theological Seminary,


will present the fourth and final Scholarly



Anna Richlin, the event organizer, wrote the following note of thanks to our home-grown a cappella group:


