# President's Message

ight is particularly valued at this time of year. As winter approaches,

and days become shorter and darkness descends earlier, we

must ensure that we are spreading light in the world. Providing a source of illumination for our community becomes a more pressing mandate.

Indeed, we must strive, especially in these upcoming months when darkness is prevalent, to live up to our synagogue's carefully chosen name. Our congregational name is taken from Psalm 97:11: "Light is sown (or zarua) for the righteous, and joy for the upright of heart." We sing this verse not only every Friday night as we chant the Kabbalat Shabbat service, but also on Kol Nidre evening as we march with Torah scrolls through the pathways of our congregation. This stirring verse is therefore both a recurring and once-a-year reminder of our mission.

Notably, this Psalms verse arguably posits an experiential sequence—light precedes joy. That is, light can be understood as a predicate of the experience of joy, a means to that objective. We must establish and spread light before we can truly experience and enjoy happiness. Working to plant and sow the seeds of light can eventually result in genuine happiness.

That same sequence is paralleled in Megillat Esther, which relays that the Jews experienced "light and happiness" in the wake of their Purim salvation, a pattern we invoke each week during the havdalah ceremony at the conclusion of Shabbat. Again, the theme of light as a prelude to joy is invoked during the celebration of an extraordinary holiday, but is also incorporated as a regular feature of our mundane existence from one week to the next. Light, thus, is commonplace and familiar—but also occasionally awe-inspiring and even miraculous.

Which, of course, brings us to our imminent celebration of Hanukkah, also known as "Hag Ha-Urim," most accurately translated as the "festival of flames."

Hanukkah is celebrated at a time when light is rare and precious; the holiday serves as a beacon of light when the physical world is at its darkest. Our Hanukkah candles must be lit so that they burn for some time when darkness prevails, so the distinction between light and darkness is clearcut. Although the Hanukkah candles cannot practically be used for illumination, they are inherent symbols of the victory of light over darkness, both spiritually and physically. Hanukkah powerfully embodies the idea that a routine resource—light—is the emblem of our remarkable endurance.

Lighting Hanukkah candles requires building momentum incrementally over eight days. We consistently expand the scope of light over the course of Hanukkah, so that our menorah emerges by the holiday's conclusion as a brightly burning flame. Just as with the lighting of the ner tamid in the Temple, which required daily rekindling and regular care to constitute an "eternal" flame, our Hanukkah candles are a symbol of recurring and enduring commitment.

So, too, at Or Zarua. Our long-term success demands short-term effort. Our sowing of congregational light, which can lead to enduring communal joy, requires perpetual attention on a daily and weekly basis. We must cultivate light within our own community, and spread light to the outside world, through vigilant care, patient planning, and purposeful commitment.

This year, then, let us enjoy Hanukkah through the prism of our Or Zarua community. Let's take it upon ourselves to sow the light within our wonderful congregation and beyond incrementally over time, so that eventually our communal flame is irrepressible. Help us grow that light and overcome the darkness this winter by attending our diverse upcoming services and programs—including our daily and Shabbat prayer services, newly opened gallery exhibit, scholarly Shabbaton, young professionals' events, and Shabbat Hanukkah musical dinner.

Join us at Or Zarua as we live up to our inspiring name, by sowing abundant light and transforming it into enduring joy.

# Greetings from the Golden Age of Jewish Postcards!

penny for your thoughts."
While no one is sure who first uttered this familiar saying, shortly before or after the turn of the 20th century, this idiomatic phrase aptly described a new phenomenon: the postcard! For the price

of a penny—one cent postcards provided a novel way of staying in touch. It was easier and faster than the practice of sending elaborately crafted, handwritten letters.

Like the rest of the world, Jews were caught up in the

pictorial potential of postcards. Hundreds of millions were mailed, and it was not unusual to see artistically displayed albums of colorful postcards in Jewish homes. They were so popular, especially from 1880 to 1915, that people wrote of a "post card craze."

The current Or Zarua Gallery show is appropriately titled, "Greetings from the

Golden Age of Jewish Postcards!" On display through the winter, it is an exhibition of vintage Jewish postcards and greeting cards from this era, generously loaned from the collection of Dr. Ira Rezak, the featured speaker at the exhibition's opening on November 1. The show comprises eight

framed wall displays, depicting such themes as Jewish Observance, Romance and Bouquets, Family Life and Children, America: The New World, Views of the Holy Land and Zionism, Biblical Personalities and Jewish

She showed me pictures of her family, and we talked about TV, movies, books, etc. She's an energetic, smart, and witty lady, but as her legs don't work so well anymore, she depends on a walker or a motorized wheelchair. Our visit was a wonderful way to start the new year."

# Or L'Atid: Youth Education and Programming

## **Hebrew School 2.0**

Students are already in the full swing of things in the inaugural year of the Hebrew School 2.0 program.

K–2 students jumped right into learning Hebrew language, starting with the phrase "Shalom Kitah Alef" (hello, first grade), learning to say the phrase and recognize the individual words. They continue to build on this phrase, learning to say "Shalom" to one another, and to use it to greet others.

The 3rd–5th-grade students continue their studies of the Jewish calendar and its correspondence with moon phases, grounding their knowledge of the holidays in a deeper understanding of the patterns and structure of the calendar. Excited students routinely come into the synagogue and volunteer which moon phase they saw the previous evening.



Together, the K–5 group has also begun their regular t'filah (prayer) services, moving through an abridged service, singing both new and old songs, reciting prayers, and becoming increasingly comfortable in the Or Zarua sanctuary. They've also explored Abraham's faith in God when learning about Lekh-Lekha and the value of welcoming guests as Abraham did in Vayera, learning the phrase "B'ruchim HaBa'im" (welcome).

Our B'nei Mitzvah scholars are off to a running start, learning Hebrew phrases they can use to talk about themselves, in addition to the origins of the Hebrew and English alphabets! They have also begun their study of mitzvot, recently considering



the difference between the commandments "zachor" (remember) and "shamor" (observe) when it comes to Shabbat.

Last but not least, our Teens@OZ have learned the word "sh'deira" (avenue), to describe where they live in Manhattan, as well as to discuss in Hebrew the personal meaning that Rosh Hashanah holds for them. Our JAMM students have begun the semester learning about the various expulsions of Jews at the end of the Medieval period, looking towards better times as they move to the emancipation of the Jews in the modern period.

It's been a great start to a year sure to be filled with rich learning!

On October 23, 65 people joined Rabbi Bolton and Sigal Hirsch for the first Family Shabbat Dinner of the year. Or Zarua members got to know families new to our community by singing, praying, learning, and, of course, eating together!
