r Zarua's social event and fundraiser this year, "A Taste of Spring" with Chef Jonathan Waxman, will be held on Thursday

evening, May 12.

Restaurateur, author, and mentor, Chef Waxman is the owner and chef of Barbuto in the West Village. Previous crowd-pleasers have included Jams and Washington Park. His book *Italian, My Way* contains 150 revitalized classic recipes that can be easily prepared at home. Chef Waxman is an engaging speaker; search for him on YouTube. His hesed activities include City Meals on Wheels.

"A Taste of Spring" will be a multifaceted event beginning with Chef Waxman's preparing dinner for up to 20 of OZ's most generous donors in the home of a Congregant. The dinner will be part of the fundraising component of the evening.

Shortly after the dinner commences, "A Taste of Spring" will begin at the Asia Society, with Chef Waxman at the helm. A projected turnout of 100 to 150 people will enjoy an "Endless Smorgasbord," wine pairings selected by Chef Waxman, and his presentation focused on cooking. All meals will be kosher. A lively auction and raffle will supplement fundraising, which will be used to support existing and novel OZ programs.

President's Message

pring is right around the corner! Purim lies ahead, and Passover is not far behind. For many, that

realization is both energizing and sobering, as substantial preparation for the year's most demanding holiday is placed on our agenda.

Once Megillat Esther is read and the raucousness of Purim is over, Passover looms large. Indeed, the Rabbis enforced a link between the holidays, mandating that they always be a month apart even in leap years, and requiring that study of the laws of Passover commence on Purim. The Talmud explains that, although the holidays are dissimilar in that one is ordained by the Torah and the other by the Rabbis, Purim is always celebrated in close proximity to Passover because "it is preferable to juxtapose one redemption [Purim] to the other redemption [Passover]" (Megillah 6b). As a child I was mindful of the coupling of the two holidays because each year my mother began her grueling Passover home-cleaning project in Purim's aftermath. If we properly participate in Purim, we at the same time begin preparing ourselves for Passover.

The joyful abandon of Purim, when we are authorized to drink wine amidst our revelry, thus leads inevitably to the rigorous rules of Passover, for which preparation must be meticulous. But preparation for Passover, while surely onerous, is also comforting. As the memory of snowstorms fades and the sun strengthens, it instructs us that we are fully transitioning from winter to spring. Along with decreasing darkness and greater illumination comes a feeling of renewal and rebirth. Passover is the pivot of that physical and spiritual transition, on a temporal arc from Purim at spring's beginning to Shavuot at its end.

Our tradition emphasizes the centrality and connection of spring to Passover, expressly calling it "hag ha-Aviv" or the holiday of spring. In its fusion of agricultural and historical dimensions, Pesah embodies the vital interaction of nature and spirit, of the material and religious worlds. Just as the earth is rejuvenated in the spring after its winter hibernation, so too are Jews reborn into a historical drama that takes us from the deliverance of Purim, to the redemption of Passover, and finally to the revelation of Shavuot. As we embrace the physical safety and warmth of spring, we also experience the spiritual elevation of these epic holidays.

Spring is a wonderful time to enjoy the natural world. The author of Song of Songs, which we read on the intermediate Shabbat of Passover, urges us to enjoy spring's bounty: "For now the winter is past, the rains are over and gone. The blossoms have appeared in the land; the time of singing has come; the song of the turtledove is heard in our land" (2:11-12). Spring is an anticipated time of new beginnings throughout our physical environment.

Yet spring is also an opportune time to enjoy vibrant Jewish life at Or Zarua. Renewal occurs both outside and inside; opportunities blossom within our own synagogue, close at hand.

Join us at Or Zarua as we celebrate Purim and Pesah in fun and meaningful ways. Participate in our pre-Purim hesed activity at Project ORE and our Matanot LaEvyonim efforts, leading up to our Purim night megillah reading followed by a musicand barbeque-filled party. I guarantee you will experience and enjoy the spirited energy of our close-knit community, across a spectrum of ages and interests, at our Purim night celebration.

Then celebrate an authentic Passover with us, filled with joy and meaning. Join our pre-Pesah zimriyah, or singing session, as we practice tunes for use throughout the holiday. For those interested in inspiring ritual and learning, our Congregational Second Seder beckons. And our Passover services will be infused with the happiness of the Hallel liturgy.

This spring, Or Zarua will be a place of renewal and opportunity. Come enjoy its bounty.

OZ Memorial Wall Plaques

laques for Congregation Or Zarua's elegant and unique Memorial Wall, honoring the memories of loved ones, are now available for purchase.

The style of the Memorial Wall, which is located on the east wall on both ends of the Sanctuary, maintains the aesthetic of the Or Zarua building. The metal plaques, produced in three different textures, will be placed in the armature spaces. The plaques will be inscribed with the loved one's name in both English and Hebrew.

The price of each plaque will be \$720.

Those who purchase plaques during the first 90 days of this program will receive a 20% discount on the purchase price. To ensure that a plaque is installed by Rosh Hashanah 5777, place your order with the synagogue office by May 31, 2016. A digital photo of the plaque will be provided to everyone who has purchased a plaque.

Similar to the model of the Capital Campaign Donor Wall located on the second floor outside the Sanctuary, the plaques

will be equal in size and prominence. To maintain this objective, the plaques will be rotated once a year. Congregants will be able to group up to four names that will move as a unit.

This is a wonderful opportunity to honor the memory of loved ones with an everlasting tribute, and for you and others to know their names fill a sacred prayer space. We will remember them in this beautiful and elegant setting.

The Haggadah tells us that every Jew must experience the Exodus from Egypt, and the Mishnah tells us that a Jew should drink four cups of wine at the seder, even if funds for these come from the public dole.

We, therefore, raise such funds each year to assist less fortunate Jews who cannot afford to prepare for Passover. Funds, called ma'ot hittim (wheat money), are forwarded to the Joint Passover Appeal in New York and the New York Board of Rabbis for distribution to needy Jews.

We hope that you will give generously to the fund. Please make your check payable to Congregation Or Zarua and write Ma'ot Hittim Fund on the memo line.

Sell Your Hametz

Before Passover, we are required to "sell" any hametz in our possession to a non-Jew. The transaction is normally arranged by the rabbi, to ensure compliance with halakhah.
