Rabbi Wechsler Speaks

Wednesdays, Feb. 6 and 13, 7:30-9:00 pm



Rabbi Wechsler will deliver two Wednesday lectures during the month of February. In them, he will share some of his recent research in the field of Jewish Theology.

February 6: "Piety and Place: Psalms 145 and 84." In this lecture Rabbi Wechsler will focus on the "Ashrei," a prayer repeated three times a day, just like the Amidah and more times a day than the Shema. Why is it so central to the liturgy? What

are the parameters of piety that are contained in the 145th psalm and what does the 84th psalm contribute to the prayer that is crucial to its importance in Jewish theology?

February 13: "Can Belief in God be Commanded?" The first of the Ten Commandments is the mitzvah to believe in God. But Rabbi Wechsler will ask: Is this a reasonable command? Shouldn't belief be the result of a personal search and the conclusions drawn from it, rather than submission to a command? Through the study of both Maimonides (Rambam) and Nachmanides (Ramban) we will explore the limits of such a command and its meaning, a meaning less obvious than you might think.

The Fabric of Survival: The Art of Esther Nisenthal Krinitz New Exhibition at the OZ Gallery January 26 to May 26 In 1942, when the Nazis ordered the Jews of the town of Mniszek in Poland to report for "relocation," 15-year-old Esther Nisenthal and her 13-year-old sister broke away from the rest of the villagers and evaded the Gestapo by pretending to be Catholic farm girls. After the war, Esther married a fellow survivor and moved to the United States. At

age 50, she began creating works of art using fabric and yarns to share her story

of enduring the Holocaust. *The Fabric of Survival* is a traveling exhibition composed of high-quality photographic reproductions of the original fabric work of Esther Krinitz circulated by Art and Remembrance (https://artandremembrance.org/about/esther-krinitz/).

Save the date - Sunday evening, April 28. We will have a special program showing the documentary film about Esther's work, *Through the Eye of the Needle*, followed by a discussion with the daughters of the artist.
