Rosh Hashanah is imminent, and with the Jewish new year come daunting challenges. The majesty and awe of the High Holy Days demand that we take affirmative action to seek to shape our own destinies. Our tradition mandates that, although our fate may ultimately be in God's hands, we can also take steps in the coming days and beyond to influence the contours of our future.

The centerpiece of the High Holy Day liturgy, the *U-Netaneh Tokef* prayer, dramatically and optimistically declares that "repentance, prayer and charitable acts (t'shuvah, t'fillah, tz'dakah) avert the severity of the decree." Yet how did these three religious concepts come to be juxtaposed within this poignant liturgical proclamation? And what is the precise role of tz'dakah in this formula—and its relationship to repentance and prayer—that can help determine our fate?

Please join our T'shuvah Lecture with Professor Alyssa M. Gray on Sunday, September 16 at 7 pm—"T'shuvah, T'fillah, Tz'dakah: What's the Connection?"—as we explore significant questions surrounding these crucial High Holy Day themes. Dr. Gray will investigate some nearly forgotten pathways of Jewish religious thought, from the Talmudic period through modernity, that

will illuminate the importance of tz'dakah in this annual period of rededication and renewal.

Dr. Gray, a foremost scholar of Rabbinic texts and theology, is the Emily S. and Rabbi Bernard H. Mehlman Chair in Rabbinics and Professor of Codes and Responsa Literature at Hebrew Union College–Jewish Institute of Religion in New York, and currently serves as Chair of the New York faculty. She received her PhD with distinction in Talmud and Rabbinics from JTS, and earned an LLM in *Mishpat Ivri* (Jewish law) from the Hebrew University Faculty of Law and a JD from the Columbia University School of Law.

Dr. Gray's current research interests are Talmud criticism, with a special focus on comparative study of the Babylonian and Jerusalem Talmuds; wealth, poverty and charity in classical and medieval rabbinic literature; and the application of new theoretical perspectives on law, literature and history to the reading of medieval Jewish legal literature. She has been a visiting professor at Yale University and JTS, and has lectured in a variety of other academic and non-academic settings.

Please join us at this pivotal time—when your fate for the coming year may hang in the balance—for an informative and inspirational lecture about the dynamics of repentance, prayer and charity. You will emerge with a deeper appreciation of traditional Jewish perspectives on that life-changing trio of concepts and actions. And *U-Netaneh Tokef* will never again be the same for you.

President's Message

We are entering the season of return. We return from summer vacation and summer homes and summer hours. While we eagerly await vacation season, there is pleasure in anticipating our return to our "regular" lives. We return to school and our "normal" schedule. We return to the opera and the symphony. And, we return to Or Zarua to begin the Jewish New Year. I hope you have renewed your membership and will join us at the High Holy Days and throughout the coming year

This is also the season of spiritual return, t'shuvah. T'shuvah is defined as a return to God, to the path of righteousness. The concept of T'shuvah also incorporates repentance. While we can do T'shuvah at any time, the High Holy Days are considered an especially auspicious time as we begin the new year. Our liturgy on Rosh Hashanah following the *U-Netaneh Tokef* includes a list of positive and negative fates in the coming year—*B'rosh ha-shanah yikkateivun, u-v'yom tzom kippur yeihateimun*—"On Rosh Hashanah it is written and on Yom Kippur it is sealed! How many will pass on, and how many will be born...." But t'shuvah, t'fillah, tz'dakah have the power to transform the harshness of our destiny. We are enjoined to repent, pray and be righteous. According to the notes in "Mahzor Lev Shalem," "t'shuvah involves self-critique and a resolve to act more in accord with one's principles." "t'fillah, often translated as prayer, this noun often implies self-judgment. Moments of t'fillah can bring insight and affirm primary religious commitments." "Tz'dakah derives from the word for righteousness or justice. It refers to all acts treating others with care and respect. In that sense, our gifts to the needy fulfill a divine obligation."

I like the idea of starting the new year refreshed and renewed. In the coming months, we will have many opportunities to be refreshed and renewed at Or Zarua. First, with six holidays that will occupy most of September — Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot, Hoshanah Rabbah, Shemini Atzeret and Simhat Torah. We will finish reading the Torah and begin again on Simhat Torah. Or L'Atid programs will begin in September, And, our varied adult

education classes start in October! See the articles in this newsletter.

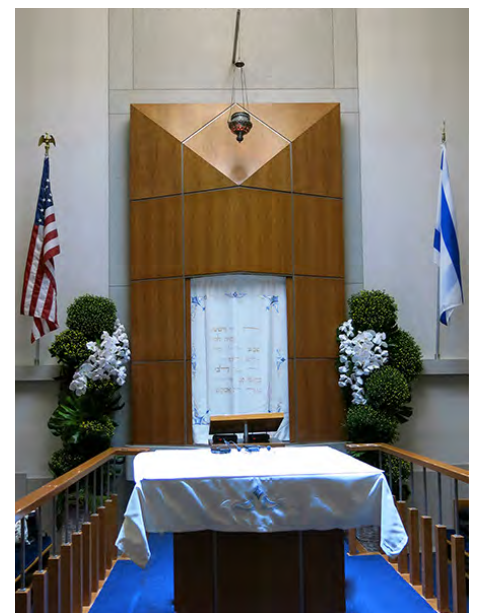
As we approach our 30th Anniversary, we are renewing our commitment to maintaining and enhancing the vibrancy of our community and to continue fulfilling our mission to provide sacred community, Or L'Atid programs, youth education, family and community learning, adult education, and connection to Israel. Steve Greenberg speaks, interviewed at OZ

Baseball icon Hank Greenberg's son, award-winning sportswriter Ira Berkow in dialogue after screening of film, *The Life and Times of Hank Greenberg*, Sunday, October 21, 6:00 pm

As baseball heads to the postseason and the World Series, the Fall classic, the OZ Gallery also is getting ready for a championship event. On Sunday, October 21, just two days before the World Series is scheduled to begin, the film *The Life and Times of Hank Greenberg* will be screened in the OZ Gallery at 6:00 pm. Following the screening, Steve Greenberg, son of the baseball legend Hank Greenberg, will be speaking about his father, interviewed by award-winning journalist, Pulitzer Prize-winning reporter Ira Berkow.

Special thanks to OZ Congregant Elaine Wolfensohn—our own OZ MVP—for inviting her friend Steve Greenberg to view our exhibition and share his memories of his remarkable father with us.

What a season this has been for our boys—or boychiks—of summer! Since July *Major League Mentsches: Jewish Stars of Baseball*, the current exhibit in the Gallery, has been welcoming visitors on Wednesday afternoons from 11 am to 2 pm. In early August, the local weekly newspaper *Our Town/Eastsider* named the OZ Gallery show its "Editor's Pick."

When the OZ Gallery committee first planned to mount a baseball show featuring historic, rarely seen memorabilia from nine Jewish ballplayers—from the 19th century to last year's World Series champions—the expectation was that the show would be informative, enlightening and entertaining. What the committee didn't know was how timely and topical it has turned out to be!

In late June, the film *The Catcher Was a Spy* was screened at the



JCC in Manhattan. Based on a book of the same name, the movie dramatizes the real World War II-era espionage activities of professional catcher Moe Berg, one of the Jewish players highlighted in *Major League Mentsches*. Among the items in the Moe Berg section is a letter from Berg to his brother relating his activities with the US Office of Strategic Services (OSS) during the war. Also this summer baseball's Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York, was scheduled to mount the exhibit, *Moe Berg: Big League Spy*, a glimpse into Berg's double life.

In the photo from the OZ exhibit accompanying this article Mr. Berg is the scowling catcher as another of our Mentsches, Hank Greenberg, approaches home plate after hitting a home run.

At this year's All-Star Game, Houston Astros third baseman Alex Bregman, the lone active player in the OZ exhibit and a member of the 2017 World Series champions, was named the Most Valuable Player (MVP). *Major League Mentsches* displays a bobblehead doll and an Alex Bregman game-used bat.

The items on display in *Major League Mentsches* are on loan to Congregation Or Zarua from Jeff Aeder, a Chicago real estate developer, restaurateur, civic leader and philanthropist and the owner of the nation's largest collection of Jewish baseball memorabilia. Mr. Aeder is the founder of the online Jewish Baseball Museum.

To the Finish Line: Prayers at the End of our Service

Thursday mornings, the Siddur Class meets to explore the richness and depth of our liturgy and to consider what meaning we make of our Jewish prayer practices. Discussions center on the language of the prayerbook, as well as comparisons to siddur manuscripts throughout the Jewish ages. We also discuss the lived experience of prayer—how to engage, when it feels empty, infusing the minyan experience with meaning. Those wondering about how prayer life can be developed find as much a place around the table, as those whose interests lie in the Hebrew of the siddur and a historical look at our liturgy. Our focus this coming year will be the prayers at the end of our services. We will look again at *Ashrei*, and talk about psalms that have been included; the selection "U'va L'Tzion," with ideas of holiness and redemption at its core; and, *Aleinu* and *Mourner's Kaddish*. When are we ever done praying?! Come join the Siddur Class on Thursday mornings.

Talmud Class for 5779

Fasting, Praying, Planting, and Walking Through the Rain: Masekhet Ta'anit

We will be studying *Masekhet Ta'anit*. In four chapters (30 pages), the Talmud explores ancient ideas about individual prayers, fasts, and communal practices to influence Heaven. Material addressed includes: prayers for rain, our relationship to the natural world (that is, rain, seasons, and agriculture), our power as "pray-ers," and the *Koheinic* blessings that were performed in ancient days. A discussion of public fast days allows for a presentation and review of Jewish history. The Rabbis begin the discussion of which is more important: a focus on tragedies or a focus on moments of success and triumph? We will see some of the earliest material in the Talmud that deals with communal prayer, which, according to some scholarship, coalesced around public fast days that were declared for the purpose of beseeching God for communal needs. Join Rabbi Bolton on Wednesday evenings to explore this fascinating tractate.

New In-person Tutoring Opportunity with Local Children

DREAM, formerly Harlem RBI, is a youth development program that began as a baseball/softball program in East Harlem 26 years ago, and today offers a charter school and after-school program serving over 2,000 youth. The backbone of DREAM is its volunteers who are needed for three programs:

- *DREAM’s after-school tutoring program, TeamBuilders*, is looking for volunteer tutors to work with middle-schoolers one afternoon a week, helping with homework, test preparation, remediation, and general enrichment. Tutors must make a commitment of one afternoon per week for a minimum of three months. Training will be provided.
- *College success mentors*, a one year commitment to mentor a low-income student transitioning to college life. Communication for this commitment is mostly done by email and phone. Want to help a child learn to read without leaving your desk? OZ tutors will be paired with an underperforming child in a school in a low-income neighborhood to read ebooks and play word games remotely every week for a 30-minute online session (which can easily be rescheduled via an online calendar). No experience is necessary although a full school year commitment is required. TutorMate is the nation’s leading online volunteer tutoring program. More than 200 leading US companies engage their employees as TutorMate volunteers, and the program has expanded to community and religious organizations. TutorMate makes it easy to volunteer. 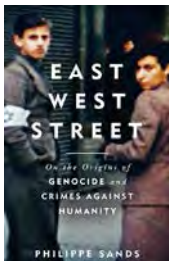

Laws for preventing genocide and crimes against humanity were driven by two Jews—Raphael Lemkin and Hersch Lauterpacht—who grew up at the same time in Lvov, Austria-Hungary. Philippe Sands' extraordinary book "East West Street," uses this coincidence to examine how justice came to be meted out to the Nazis who perpetrated the Holocaust. In a tale that reads like a detective story, Sands unearths the intertwined histories of these Jews from Lvov (including his own grandfather), and considers the legal principles born of this history.

High Holy Day Services 5779/2018

General information

Our High Holy Day services will be held at Wallace Hall, on the west side of Park Avenue between 83rd and 84th Streets, not far from our synagogue building on East 82nd Street.

OZ offers three types of services for the High Holy Days: a main service, led by Rabbi Scott Bolton; youth services, divided by age; and a Family Learning Experience, led by Rabbi Amy Bolton. Youth services will be held on both days of Rosh Hashanah, Kol Nidre, and Yom Kippur. Please note that children 2–4 years old must be accompanied by no more than one parent. There will be a Mah Zeh?! program for Teens on Yom Kippur. Teenagers are encouraged to attend the main service. Please review the High Holy Day services schedules, on this page (see right) and the services for youth on page 10 for times and locations.

The Family Learning Experience (FLEX), described on page 10, led by Rabbi Amy Bolton, is designed for the entire family and

is not a drop-off service. It will be held in the Or Zarua library from 10:45 am to 12:45 pm on the second day of Rosh Hashanah and on Yom Kippur. Grandparents are also invited. Times and locations are listed on the Youth services schedule on page 10.

If you know of people who might be without a place to go for High Holy Day Services, please have them contact the office (212-452-2310, ext 12).

The schedule for all main services will be printed on the reverse side of your admission ticket. Tickets will be mailed in mid-September to all members in good standing; remember to bring your ticket with you to all services at both Wallace Hall and OZ. Call the synagogue office with questions regarding your membership. Note that all children through the age of 22 are included in family membership; children 23 and older are required to have guest tickets. Call the synagogue office, 212-452-2310, ext 12, or go online to Chaverweb to purchase guest tickets.

Jews and Christians Read the Song of Songs With Robert Harris, PhD JTS Context Class at Or Zarua Six Tuesdays beginning November 6, 6:30 pm



Our next JTS Context is a six-session course presented by Dr. Robert A. Harris, associate professor of Bible and Ancient

Semitic Languages at JTS. Dr. Harris teaches courses in biblical literature and commentary, particularly medieval Jewish biblical exegesis.

This course will explore how the meaning of "Song of Songs" developed from ancient love poems into a time-honored allegory - essentially shared by both rabbinic sages of the Talmud and the fathers of the Church and then how medieval sages came to understand the book not only as an allegory of the love God has for the people of Israel (or, in Christianity, the love of God for "His Church"), but also as a poetic narrative

about the erotic love between a young couple in biblical days. In particular, we will see how reading this biblical book according to its peshat, or contextual meaning, allowed "the voice of the woman" to emerge as a narrator of this poetic composition. Finally, we will examine how a variety of other interpretations (Jewish kabbalah as well as Christian mysticism) re-allegorize the Song into a kind of "radical midrash."

The course meets in the OZ library and begins on November 6 (see the OZ calendar in the next issue of the newsletter); tuition is \$325. This reading-intensive seminar is designed for graduates of the Me'ah or Context two-year program or for those with similar Jewish learning backgrounds. Crime and the Kehillah: Accusation and Response

Jewish History with Barry Feldman

Four Sundays: October 14 & 28 and November 4 & 11, 10 am-12 noon



Or Zarua Congregant Barry Feldman will again lead a four-session course covering the history of the Kehillah.

In 1906, New York City Police Commissioner Theodore Bingham asserted that half the city's criminals were Jews. Although a widespread backlash forced Bingham to issue a retraction, Bingham's message was loud and clear. New York's Jewish population was considered a menace to more "polite" [that is, "native"] New York society. The Jewish response was the New York Kehillah: an attempt to organize communal activities under a single umbrella and present a united productive image of Jews as New Yorkers and Americans.

How was the Kehillah organized? Who were the leaders? What challenges did it face? Did it meet expectations? Using primary documents to spark discussion,

this class will examine the successes and challenges of the Kehillah.

Barry is an urban historian, museum educator, and licensed New York City tour

guide. He has created and developed tours of the Jewish Lower East Side, Jewish Harlem, and other New York neighborhoods. He has been teaching at OZ since 2014.



Each year, OZ Congregant Barry Feldman teaches a four-session class on NYC Jewish history. Past classes have included "*Machlokis, Tzuris & Achdus: Disputes, Troubles, and Unity During the Iconic Period of Jewish Settlement in NYC*" and "*Life in the Streets on the Lower East Side During the Iconic Period of Immigration and Settlement.*" The class attracts up to 30 people per session. Barry's classes are open to all. Prior knowledge is not required, and you may attend any or all sessions. We hope to see you this year as we continue to study NYC Jewish history with Barry.
