The Written Word in the Digital Age

with Community Members Hana Alberts, Jane Levere, and Arlene Simon Moderated by Rabbi Bolton

The Jewish People has a love affair with the written word, and now there are more ways than stones, scrolls, parchment and paper to enjoy all forms of writing. In the last decades an explosion of online and digital publications have created new ways to read and new channels for journalism. Blogs and electronic libraries are replacing diaries and repositories of bound books alike. Volumes once relegated or reserved in specialized libraries are online. Newspapers and news services deliver articles in new digital formats. Has quality of writing improved, stayed the same, changed? What is the impact on the written word, as more writing, journalism and text books take digital formats? Our panelists will present about their specialized areas of journalism and editing. Rabbi Bolton will reflect on whether a digital library of Torah volumes or Talmud and other Jewish sources retains its sanctity when it is digitalized. What is the future of "hard copy" textbooks, newspapers and Torah commentaries? Will the written word, in print, always be mightier than the mouse?

President's Message

I sh'losha devarim ha'olam omeid: Al ha'Torah, v'al haavodah v'al gemilut hasadim. The world stands on three things: On the Torah, on divine service and on deeds of loving-kindness.

These words from *Pirke Avot* (Chapter I, 2) reflect the founding principles of Congregation Or Zarua. And, we bring these to life each and every day in our community.

For our Congregation, Torah is paramount. We study the Torah portion each Shabbat and holiday — the central element of our services — and we read the entire parasha together, shared among volunteers. Members are encouraged to learn to read Torah and we have new readers every year.

Torah also refers to learning. We at Or Zarua pride ourselves in being a learning community—dedicated to learning for both children and adults. Every day and most evenings, the building is abuzz with learning

Or L'Atid is thriving. Or L'Atid—our youth education program—includes Hebrew School, Shabbat morning, and holiday programs for children of all ages, a tot weekday music class, and a variety of learning opportunities for youth, teens and their parents. In total, around 125 children from birth to age 17 participate in some youth program throughout the course of the year.

It has been said that one of the greatest threats to Jewish continuity is Jewish cultural illiteracy. At OZ, we strive to enhance Jewish cultural literacy among our adults. We educate through classes in Talmud, Siddur, Torah and Haftorah reading, Oral Law and New York Jewish History. Since 2004, we have hosted Me'ah and Context classes first under the aegis of Hebrew College and then JTS. This year, we are sponsoring our own OZ Perspectives classes.

Shavuot begins on the evening of June 8. Shavuot commemorates the time when the first fruits were harvested and brought to the Temple (Hag ha-Bikkurim — the Festival of the First Fruits). Shavuot also celebrates the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai (Hag Matan Torateinu—the Festival of the Giving of Our Torah). We celebrate this holiday with a rededication to learning.

The second of Or Zarua's founding principles is avodah, translated as divine service or service to God. Our prayer services are central to our existence. We


come together each morning for spiritual awakening and to support our members who are saying Kaddish. And, we come together on Shabbat and holidays to pray to God together. But, avodah also means work. We learn in Pirke Avot Chapter II, 2, that one must work for a living: Rabban Gamliel, son of Rabbi Yehudah Ha-Nassi taught: "The study of Torah is commendable when combined with a gainful occupation, for when a person toils in both, sin is driven out of mind."

The third principle, gemilut hasadim—that the world is sustained through acts of loving-kindness—is also well practiced at Or Zarua. We continue to feed the former homeless in our community, visit the elderly homebound, donate clothing to the less fortunate, collect money for the hungry in our own community and in Israel, and provide comfort to our members who are ill or in mourning. And 20 of us have been tutoring underprivileged readers in New York City public schools through TutorMate, an online literacy program.

The success of our congregation in fulfilling these three principles depends greatly on your participation as a learner, davener, volunteer and generous supporter. There are so many ways to be involved at Or Zarua, and the more you are involved, the more you will feel part of the community. So, I urge you to look to Shavuot to rededicate yourself to Or Zarua's founding principles as exemplified in our tagline, "Learn, Pray, Participate and Connect."

A Case of Mixed Emotions: Love and Fear of God in Jewish Thought

Marc Ashley's adult education course between Pesah and Shavuot

he very first word of the first paragraph of the Shema prayer instructs—indeed, commands—us to love God, with all our heart, soul and might. Yet Proverbs counsels us that the "beginning of wisdom is the fear of God" These visceral emotions, at least at first glance, seem conflicting rather than complementary. So which is the core and foundation of our relationship with God—love or fear? Which approach takes priority?

As it turns out, Judaism demands that we experience our relationship with God as encompassing emotions that optimally reinforce each other but may in practice be competing. God as the creator of the universe can seem utterly transcendent, above and beyond our understanding. Yet God as the divine force that intervenes in history and shows solicitude for human beings can seem immanent, close at hand

and within our reach. The focus of our relationship with God may vary depending on the vagaries of our perception of God's interaction with us. As we sing several times during the High Holy Day liturgy in the *Ki Anu Amekha* prayer, we can relate to God variously as our parent, master, shepherd, guardian, creator, king, and beloved. Whether we are more inclined to love or fear God can shift with circumstances.

In fact, dictating emotion is notoriously difficult, and Jewish theology is prone to interpreting love and fear of God as anchored in conduct. How we are expected to feel emotionally about God is often translated into practical terms. Love and fear of God are expressed through deed.

Both love and fear of God are thus crucial religious directives. Fear of God generates a sense of humility, preventing God from becoming merely an imprimatur for our decisions. Love of God can create a sense of our wondrous human potential, fostering our nearness to the realm of the infinite. Both approaches to God can be viable paths to the divine, but reconciling them can be challenging and even perplexing.

The final two sessions of this year's course, "A Case of Mixed Emotions: Love and Fear of God in Jewish Thought," will be held on two Monday evenings, May 6 and May 13, at 7:30 pm in the Or Zarua library. You need not have attended the first session to participate in either of the final two sessions, and no prior knowledge is required. Please come and participate in this important conversation on a crucial theme in Jewish thought through the ages.

oin us in honoring Israel Independence Day/Yom Ha'atzmaut with a light sampling of delicious Israeli foods followed by this inspiring movie.

In 1948, just three years after the liberation of Nazi death camps, a group of Jewish-American

World War II pilots volunteered to fight for Israel in the War of Independence. In secret and at great personal risk, they smuggled planes out of the U.S. and flew for Israel in its War

of Independence. As members of Machal – "volunteers from abroad" – this ragtag band of brothers not only turned the tide of the war and prevented the possible annihilation of Israel at the very moment of its birth; they also embarked on personal journeys of discovery and renewed Jewish pride. They laid the groundwork for the Israeli Air Force. Above and Beyond is their story.

The first major feature-length documentary about the foreign airmen

in the '48 War, Above and Beyond brings together new interviews with the pilots, as well as stunning aerial footage, to present a fascinating, little-known tale filled with heart, heroism and high-flying chutzpah. The film follows the pilots on their circuitous route

from the United States—where they met and trained in secret and struggled to stay two steps ahead of the FBI—to Panama, Italy and Czechoslovakia, and where they flew versions of Nazi

planes they had tried to shoot down in World War II.

Filmed in the U.S., Israel and the United Kingdom, Above and Beyond is produced by Nancy Spielberg (Elusive Justice: The Search for Nazi War Criminals, Who Will Write Our History) and directed by Roberta Grossman.


