espite the pandemic that has closed our building for the past several months, Or Zarua's adult educational programming

remains ongoing, accessible and vibrant. We have sustained our robust learning community through a varied menu of virtual classes, lectures and sermons. Our year-round learning opportunities continue this summer with a three-part lecture series in July by Dr. Ronnie Perelis, a world-class scholar of Sephardic history and culture.

Dr. Perelis, Chief Rabbi Dr. Isaac Abraham

and Jelena (Rachel) Alcalay Associate
Professor of Sephardic Studies at the
Bernard Revel Graduate School of Jewish
Studies and the Director of the Rabbi Arthur
Schneier Program for International Affairs
at Yeshiva University, will explore various
stages of medieval and early modern
Sephardic experience and expression.
The Jews of the Iberian Peninsula in the
fourteenth century and beyond endured
intense persecution and crisis, yet emerged
from their recurring traumas to embody
heroic resilience and creativity.

The Jews of Spain created an unrivaled culture during their millennial stay in the Iberian Peninsula. These Sephardim were deeply rooted in their Jewish tradition but also vigorously enmeshed in the economic,

political and cultural life of their broader society. After an extended period of thriving splendor, however, the Jews of Spain were persecuted, forcibly converted and eventually expelled, leading to communal fragmentation and dispersion.

Yet Sephardic creativity was not extinguished with the expulsion. With the rise of the Converso class, Jewish identity took on new forms and expressions. Dr. Perelis will focus his lecture series on pivotal moments in Sephardic history including the riots of 1391, the establishment of the Inquisition, the expulsions from and forced baptisms in Spain and Portugal, the conquest of the Americas, and the rebirth of open Jewish life in cosmopolitan

Tisha B'Av: Lamenting Our Sins or Our Suffering?

isha B'Av seems to be an anomaly on the Jewish calendar. Coming in the wake of Shavuot that joyously celebrates the gift of our Torah, and falling amidst summer

warmth and bloom, this 25-hour fast is the saddest day of the year.

But what is the nature of the sadness we should be feeling? What, indeed, is the spiritual essence of this distinctive day?

The answer is complex, as Tisha B'Av embodies competing conceptions of God and Jewish history. On the one hand, the Rabbis of the Talmud taught that the

destruction of both ancient Temples on Tisha B'Av reflected God's punishment for our sins, including gratuitous enmity among fellow Jews. Within this theological framework, Jewish tragedy is directly attributable to our misconduct. On the other hand, Jewish tradition over time made Tisha B'Av a repository of numerous calamities, a day of mourning largely free of guilt. In combination, Tisha B'Av has thus become a hybrid day of lamentation for both deserved tragedies and unjustified suffering. Its mixed religious nature begs the question of whether our focus should be on our repentance or our resilience.

The book of Eikha (Lamentations) that we read on Tisha B'Av evening embodies this spiritual conundrum. Its poignant text reflects theological conceptions that frame God's anger as both justified and unconstrained, that explain Jewish pain as a byproduct of both wrongdoing and victimhood. Perhaps Eikha's paradoxical presentation of God should be unsurprising, as Exodus depicts God's attributes as encompassing both infinite kindness and unremitting justice. But it may nevertheless leave us with disquieting concerns about God's temper.

Please join us on the evening of Monday, July 27, in advance of the fast day later that week, as congregant Marc Ashley explores Tisha B'Av's mosaic of complex themes, reflecting diverse perspectives of both God and the Jewish historical experience. In the Or Zarua tradition, Jewish learning can accompany and inform our observance of this important day.

ith thanks to the founders of Congregation Or Zarua for term limits, I am embarking on my final year as Or Zarua's president. In 2011, when I became president the first

time, I remarked that all OZ presidents had their challenges—creating a synagogue community out of thin air, building the congregation, building a permanent home, growing the membership, educating our adults and children, buying a rabbinic apartment, finding a new rabbi. Not to mention finding a new venue for the High Holy Days on a few weeks' notice and fixing leaks from a hidden water heater—and raising the money to do it all!

But, nothing could have prepared us for COVID-19 and its havoc. We have lost members and members have lost family. Members, including our beloved rabbi and his wife, were laid low for weeks. Thank God, they have recovered their health and strength.

And, so will we.

As the media keep telling us—we are all in this together. And, together, we will prevail.

We are in good financial shape to weather this storm. With the reduction of programs in the building and careful spending, we have been able to balance the budget for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2020.

Our Director of Youth Education and Programming, Sigal Hirsch, has creatively adapted to online learning until we are back in our building on a regular basis. Sigal has developed online summer programs to educate and entertain our children who cannot go to day camp or sleepaway camp. We continue to educate the next generation of the Jewish people.

As I am sure you have seen from our weekly e-blasts, we offer myriad services, classes and programs—all via Zoom.

Through Zoom, OZ continues to be open for community and connection—for minyan, and programs, and education for our adults and children—serving our community with vitality and warmth.

Look through this July newsletter. It is full of activities for this coming month for adults and children. It reflects the depth and breadth of our community activities.

Our physical doors may be closed, but we are definitely open!

We eagerly anticipate the day when we literally are able to open our doors—legally

and safely. We have formed a Reopening Task Force that is made up of our Health Task Force and some Board Members and other congregants, as well as Sigal, Helene and Rabbi Bolton. We are working on plans to reopen the building as soon as we can do it in a way that ensures the health and safety of all who enter the doors.

We are also working on plans for the High Holy Days. Of course, any plans we make will be contingent on the rules and regulations in place at the time. Or Zarua will have High Holy Day services and online material for all, in some form. Rabbi Bolton is considering multiple shorter in-person experiences as well as planning a video library with our Readers & Leaders Committee. We are also hopeful that we will be able to organize outdoor shofar blowing with neighboring congregations.

Until we are in the building full time, we will continue to hold weekday Zoom services, classes and meetings. During the month of July, we will have a summer scholar-in-residence, Professor Ronnie Perelis. He will be teaching a three-part series on Wednesday evenings called "The Exiles of Jerusalem in Sepharad": Crisis, Creativity and Resilience.

As always, we welcome your suggestions for building our community, now and in the future

Very soon, you will receive information about membership renewal. We hope you will join us as we embark on our 32nd year as a congregation. It will most certainly be an adventure! And, if you know people who would be interested in Or Zarua, please send them our way.

We are all in this together! And, together we will prevail and thrive.

I am looking forward to a bright future. Or Zarua La Tzadik, u'lishrei lev simcha. Light is sown for the righteous and joy for the upright of heart.

At this time, many of the organizations that we partner with and with whom our members volunteer have greater needs

than ever

"Hesed hafatzti!" (Hosea 6:6) The Prophet teaches us that God desires our pursuit of kindness. Abraham and Sarah were thought highly of by God, because they committed themselves and future generations to tzedakah. (Genesis 15:6)

The organizations we support allow us to fight racial injustice, food insecurity and help to provide the fundamental services people need to become self-sufficient or less dependent in the long-run. We encourage you to learn more about the organizations we are invested in; we feel they help us extend our hands and hearts and do the justice work that our tradition demands of us.

Due to ongoing COVID-19 restrictions, OZ is not sending volunteers out at this time, but please read below to see how you can help.

New York Common Pantry: Our long-time partner, has remained open and is deemed an "essential service" during the COVID-19 crisis. They are seeing huge demand for their services. The best way to help is to make a donation through our Hesed Fund. You

can learn more about the Pantry here: http://nycommonpantry.org You can also donate needed pantry staples—particularly rice and pasta—via the Pantry's Amazon list.

NYCP has begun to take volunteers again, using a small number of volunteers on day-to-day projects. As restrictions are lifted additional volunteers will be needed. Currently we are not coordinating shifts, but if you are not at extra risk according to CDC Guidelines, don't have anyone at home who is at high risk, are 18-plus years old, and feel comfortable coming in to volunteer—ideally from 9:00 am-1:00 pm if you are a heavy lifter or an all day shift (9:00 am-4:00 pm)—please reach out to Debby Lowenstein (dlowenstein@nycommonpantry.org) at the Pantry. Let her know that you are from Or Zarua.

They have masks, gloves and hand sanitizer and the facilities are cleaned regularly.

We are looking into other organizations that our members can volunteer with by phone or computer.





Amsterdam. He will review a variety of primary sources, both texts and images, to allow us to better appreciate the complexities of this arduous but inspiring historical narrative.

Dr. Perelis explores the vitality of Sephardic history with his students

at Yeshiva University and in a variety of adult educational settings. His essays on Sephardic history analyze the dynamics of religious transformation within the context

of the crypto-Jewish experience, and his book, Narratives from the Sephardic Atlantic: Blood and Faith (Indiana University Press). explores family and identity in the Sephardic Atlantic world. Dr. Perelis is currently working on a critical edition, English translation and historical study of the rediscovered manuscripts of Luis de Carvajal, a sixteenthcentury Mexican crypto-Jewish thinker. This project will offer readers the first opportunity to delve deeply into the spiritual world of a remarkable early modern religious thinker and provide a window into crypto-Jewish life in the Americas. Dr. Perelis has lectured widely in the United States and throughout the world, and has served on the board of the Latin American Jewish Studies

Organization and the advisory board of the American Sephardi Federation.

Please join us as Dr. Perelis hosts a compelling journey through the poignant crises and impressive achievements of medieval and early modern Sephardic Jews, as he engages the past while keeping an eye on contemporary concerns. Make July a time of exciting and insightful learning about often overlooked dimensions of Jewish history, experience and expression.
