Schiowitz will give two lectures focused on notions of repentance in prophetic literature.

Shira Schiowitz is a Tanakh teacher at SAR High School where she also serves as co-director of professional development and mentors new teachers. She previously chaired the Tanakh department at Ma'ayanot Yeshiva High School, and also served as Assistant Dean and helped facilitate the opening at Lamdeinu, an adult education institute in Teaneck. She received her MA in Bible at the Bernard Revel Graduate School of Jewish Studies at Yeshiva University.

In Royalty, Responsibility and Limits on Power: The Prophets' Expanded Application of the Laws of Kings, Ms. Schiowitz will present texts from Tanakh and Jewish thought that will allow us to reflect on our individual accountability and creative power. The prophets make use of laws from Deuteronomy regarding appointment of a Jewish king to help individuals of all stations find balance in life between power and moral agency. Our challenge is to live within an appropriate dialectic of creativity and humility, as God wants us to be masters of our world yet within prescribed limitations. Our prophetic literature illuminates that productive dialectic.

The second lecture. Do the Haftarot of Elul Get Us On the Path of T'shuvah?. will feature our liturgical cycle during the late summer. While Elul is regarded as the corridor towards t'shuvah, we continue to read haftarot from Isaiah connected to a post-Tisha B'Av mindset of consolation. The manner in which these prophetic readings fit into the larger framework of High Holy Days preparations is obscure. This lecture will address why we don't read Haftarot expressly about repentance during the month leading up to Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Our prophetic literature has been a source of profound wisdom and inspiration through the ages, but is sometimes ignored or underappreciated. In the Or Zarua tradition of adult learning, at this crucial time of the Jewish year, please join us as Ms. Schiowitz illuminates the prophets' lessons for contemporary times.

President's Message



am writing this on Tisha B'Av, the saddest day on the Jewish calendar. We fast in commemoration of great tragedies in Jewish history including the destruction of the First and Second Temples,

the Crusades, the expulsions from England, France and Spain, the Holocaust, and, most recently, Pittsburgh and Poway.

At the end of the day, we commemorate the ability of the Jewish people to survive and thrive.

Today, I think we are also in mourning for our pre-COVID lives, secular and Jewish. I have not been in the Or Zarua building since February 29. I don't know when I will return. And, the uncertainty makes me sad. I am sure it makes you sad, too.

As we approached Passover this year, I was very unhappy contemplating not hosting Seders in my home. And, then, I started thinking about the possibilities of a ZOOM Seder! I realized that we could host Seders for as many people as we wanted. We didn't have to worry about having enough chairs or feeding a large crowd! We hosted 27 people for the first Seder. Our in-person capacity is 20.

As we approach the High Holy Days, I am feeling similarly sad that, whatever we will do, it won't be the usual. But, just as I did with Passover, I am thinking about how to make these days meaningful in new ways.

So, too, the Or Zarua community is in the midst of rethinking our observances so that we will honor our past but deal with the realities of our present.

The Reopening Task Force is at work considering all aspects of how to reopen the building as soon as we can do it legally and safely for all who enter our doors.

And, the High Holy Days Committee is at work creating experiences that will honor our sacred traditions and bring us together as a community.

Thank you to the nearly 200 members who completed the OZ High Holy Days survey. Your responses are informing decisions about our observance. We will announce High Holy Days plans as soon as possible.

By this time, you should have received your membership renewal via email. As I mentioned in my cover letter, "You might ask why you should renew your membership when High Holy Days plans are uncertain. My answer is that Congregation Or Zarua is more than a physical space for us to express our Jewish traditions and values. Or Zarua is our community that ensures the continuity of the Jewish People. At Or Zarua, it is incumbent upon us to maintain a community where people of all Jewish backgrounds feel welcome and comfortable to learn, pray, participate and connect with us. We strive to be inclusive, not exclusive. And, if we want the community to be available to us when we need it, we must support it."

Even during this crisis, we have continued to educate our children and our adults, conduct services, and continue programs and classes. We have had special lectures and enjoyed a Summer-Scholar-in-Residence. And, Rabbi Bolton has performed funerals and burials, visited the sick, offered spiritual counseling, performed weddings in backyards and ZOOMed in for baby namings and brisses.

Your support ensures that we can continue to meet the needs of our community, now and when we are able to return to our building.

Our dues also support our staff and maintenance of our building. And, our dues support our rabbi and the wonderful work he does to provide leadership and guidance to our community in good times and in bad.

Please renew your membership this month.

Throughout history, we Jews have met seemingly insurmountable challenges and thrived. Or Zarua is doing the same. Eventually, we will be back in our building and back to our routines.

I encourage you to continue to learn, pray, participate and connect with us.

beginning October 21 Jews in a Non-Jewish World: Idol Worship and Living With Others. Chapter I of Masekhet Avodah Zarah

Throughout history, Jews have maintained strong religious beliefs and cultural ties. The Talmudic Sages, through the paradigm of exploring the mitzvah of refraining from and even abolishing idol worship, confront us with questions: how do we, as Jews, navigate living in a non-Jewish world? How much interaction and integration is acceptable, when it comes to business or socializing with neighbors? Should there be any limits? The Rabbis' discussions and debates about the prohibition against idol worship is engaged as a framework of thought concerning the Jewish People's place among the nations of the world. From the beginning of Tractate Avodah Zarah (Idol Worship) the Sages expand on laws that seem black and white on their face but move us into discussions about living in the complex world of kaleidoscopic humanity. Come join the learning no matter what your background. Students may bring either the Artscroll Schottenstein Volume. 1 Avodah Zarah or the Koren Talmud Bavli Avoda Zara -Horayot volume to class. Class meets at 7:30 pm on Wednesday evenings throughout the year, after the holiday season.

"I Thought the Service Was Over!" Readings, Songs and Passages of Study After the **Official Morning Prayers**

The Siddur is not only a prayerbook but a repository for passages of study, hymns to sing, and glorious, poetic songs. We will studypassages from the Rambam like the Thirteen Principles of Faith, collections of Torah verses prepared for the worshipper who wanted to go right to study after prayers and other materials that were inserted into the post-service sections of printed siddurim stemming from manuscripts of the Middle Ages. Of course, already in the Talmud, certain Sages would add personal prayers and pleas of their own after their recitations of the Amidah. Those personal prayer passages have made their way into some prayer rites, as well, at the end of morning services. They stand on their own as petitionary poetry, and we will study them as stand alone liturgy. In this class we sing, listen to the music of prayer, discuss prayer life and examine prayer language closely. Come gain understandings and add meaning to prayer life. Join us at 8:40 am on Thursdays after the holiday season.








gripping story lines, the consequences of the plague that devastated London during the 1660s. For a review go to: https://tinyurl.com/0ZB1July2020.

Video and Microphone

If you want to talk you must have a microphone or call in on the phone.

Please make sure you are in a relatively quiet place. If you talk to someone else when you are unmuted we can hear you.
