The search for the leaven (Bedikat Hametz) is to be conducted on Tuesday evening, March 30. No hametz is to be eaten after 10:47 a.m., and all hametz must be sold by 11:53 a. m. on Wednesday, March 31 A form for the sale of your hametz through Rabbi Wechsler is included in this newsletter. On erev Pesah, Wednesday morning, we will daven shaharit at 7:30 a.m. in the Synagogue to mark the fast of the first born. A full schedule of the services for Passover is set out on page 8 and in the calendar.

As in past years, Or Zarua will conduct a communal Seder on the second night of Passover. Rabbi Wechsler will lead the Seder, which will take place at Congregation Kehilath Jeshurun on 85th Street. Reservations are required. Reservation forms are included in this newsletter and must be returned to the office by Thursday, March 25th.

One of the centerpieces of the Haggadah and of the Exodus account is the recounting of the ten plagues. The structure of the ten plagues is discussed in great depth by Professor Nahum Sarna in his study, Exploring Exodus: The Heritage of Biblical Israel (1986). A brief excerpt is set out below for your reference:

"The plagues are arranged in the form of three series of calamities comprising three afflictions in each series. The tenth is climactic and lies wholly outside the series in that it, alone, has no grounding in natural events. It belongs in the realm of the supernatural. Within each series, the first two plagues are each preceded by divine forewarning, while the third strikes each time unheralded. Again, in the case of the first plagues in each series Moses is bidden to confront the pharaoh 'in the morning,' but no time indication is given with respect of the other two. Also common to the first,

fourth, and seventh plagues is the manner in which God's instruction to Moses is formulated. He is told, 'Station yourself' before the pharaoh; the verbal stem y-ts-b is used each time. The second, fifth, and eighth plagues share the introductory formula, 'Go to Pharaoh,' in which the verb b-w-' is uniformly employed. The third plague in each series has no common instruction formula. Finally, the entire first series of the three plagues is wrought through the instrumentality of Aaron, the entire last series is accomplished through the agency of Moses."

Although our focus in these weeks is on Pesah, we should all be aware of the many important community events that will occur in April and early May. Information about these events is contained in the calendar and elsewhere in this newsletter. These events include: Yom HaShoah, Tuesday, April 13; Yom Ha'Atzmaut, Wednesday, April 21; the May 5th poetry lecture by Ann Lerner.

We have had some very busy and interesting times at the Hebrew School over the past months. Upon returning fro winter vacation, we were privileged to participate in an exciting project called "Wings of Witness." Artist Jeffrey Schrier brought his collection of soda can tabs to our school so that we could all be part of a work of art in progress. The soda can tabs were collected from around the nation to represent all of those who perished during the Holocaust. Students, parents and teachers all worked to string these tabs together to create enormous symbolic wings which will travel to Atlanta, GA to be on exhibit at the Holocaust museum there. Our Bet and up students also had the opportunity to view the movie "Prince of Egypt" right here in the neighborhood. Life and Death Matters - The Or Zarua Hevra Kadisha

It may be customary for the members of a synagogue's Hevra Kadisha not to draw attention to the specific roles they play in the rituals surrounding a person's death, but it's important to remind the community of the group's purpose and services.

Or Zarua's Hevra Kadisha was founded several years ago to help implement those religious practices that insure respect for the dead and provide consolation for the mourners, and to educate and guide families in decisions concerning the funeral, burial, and period of shivah for a parent, spouse, sibling, or child.

Do you know that the deceased is not supposed to be left alone from the time of death until the funeral? Members of our Hevra Kadisha, rather than "professionals" provided by the funeral home, can serve as *shomrim* (watchers), reciting psalms beside the coffin.

Are you aware that an unadorned, unupholstered pine coffin is the kind Jews are supposed to use? Do you know that the deceased is ritually washed and dressed in plain linen garments like the ones that were worn by the High Priest in the Temple on Yom Kippur? Instead of funeral home employees, Hevra Kadisha members can perform the tahara (purification), takhrikhim (shrouding), and placement in the aron (coffin). (First-timers work alongside those with more experience.)

Did you realize that you would find a edat havraah (meal of consolation), complete with bagels, lox, and hard-boiled eggs, in your kitchen after the funeral of a loved one? Or that the "stranger" who

Yom Ha-Atzmaut Israel Independence Day

Yom Ha-Atzmaut, Israel Independence Day, will occur this year on Tuesday evening, April 20th, and Wednesday, April 21st. Or Zarua will celebrate on Tuesday evening with special services.

Since the day before Independence day is observed in Israel as Yom Hazikaron, Memorial Day for all the soldiers who fell in establishing and defending the Jewish State, our observance will begin with a special Yom Hazikaron Minhah service at 7:30 p.m.

This service will be followed by the special prayers for Yom Ha-Atzmaut, which will include the blowing of the shofar. Afterwards we will celebrate with Israeli food and music.

was the tenth man or woman at a 7:30 a.m. shivah minyan in your living room was a Hevra Kadisha member?

But why wait until you need us? Come to the shivah minyans. Attend our next meeting. Help us resolve some thorny issues, such as whether to secure a synagogue cemetery plot in the metropolitan area, when such space is rapidly dwindling.

We need you now!

From Swords into Poems

Thus, Dr. Lerner's title of the evening: "From Swords into Poems: Israeli War Poetry." Everyone is welcome.

Passover Guide

This guide was prepared by the Rabbinical Assembly Committee on Jewish Law and Standards by Rabbi Mayer Rabinowitz. It was accepted by the Committee on December 12, 1984. The last paragraph of the introduction, as well as Part A under "Permitted Foods," have been amended to reflect more recent decisions of the Committee affecting the status of peanuts, peanut oil and certain cheeses.

The Torah prohibits the ownership of hametz during Pesah. Therefore, we arrange for the sale of the hametz to a non-Jew. The transfer, mekhirat hametz, is accomplished by appointing an agent, usually the rabbi, to handle the sale. It is a valid and legal transfer of ownership. At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of ownership of the now-permitted hametz. If ownership of the hametz is not transferred before the holiday, the use of this hametz is prohibited after the holiday as well (hametz she-aver alav ha-Pesah).

Since the Torah prohibits the eating of hametz during Pesah, and since many common foods contain some admixture of hametz, guidance is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesah. During the eight days of Pesah, hametz cannot lose its identity in an admixture. Therefore, the minutest amount of hametz renders the whole admixture hametz and its use on Pesah is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, hametz follows the normal rules of admixture, i.e., it

loses its identity in an admixture of one part *hametz* and sixty parts of *non-hametz*. This affords us an opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during *Pesah*.

What follows is a general guideline. However, Rabbi Wechsler should be consulted when any doubt arises.

Kosher *le-Pesah* labels that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting Rabbi Wechsler.

Prohibited foods:

include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereals, coffees containing cereal derivatives, wheat, barley oats, spelt, rye and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol. Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (kitniyot) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, corn, legumes (beans and peas; however, string beans are permitted). The Committee on Jewish Law and Standards has ruled unanimously that peanuts and peanut oil are permissible, as peanuts are not actually legumes. Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example, corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Consult Rabbi Wechsler for guidance in the use of these products.

Permitted foods:

A. The following foods require no kosher le-Pesah label if purchased prior to Pesah: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives (however, be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP); sugar, pure tea, salt (not iodized), pepper, natural spices, frozen fruit juices with no additives, frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes, see above), milk; butter, cottage cheese, cream cheese, ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft) and Camembert (soft), frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives), baking soda.

B. The following foods require no kosher *le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during *Pesah*: fresh fruits and vegetables (for legumes, see above), eggs, fresh fish and fresh meat.

C. The following foods require a kosher le-Pesah label if purchased before or during Pesah: All baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices (these juices are often clarified with kitniyot which are not listed among the ingredients. However, if one knows there are no such agents, the juice may be purchased prior to Pesah without a kosher le-Pesah label); canned tuna (since tuna, even when packed in water often been processed in vegetable broth and/or hydrolyzed

protein – however, if it is known that the tuna is packed exclusively in water without any additional ingredients or additives, it may be purchased without a kosher *le-Pesah* label); wine, vinegar, liquor, oils, dried fruits, candy, chocolate flavored milk, ice cream, yogurt, and soda.

D. The following processed foods (canned, bottled or frozen) require a kosher le-Pesah label if purchased during Pesah: milk, butter, juices, vegetables, fruit, milk products, spices, coffee, tea and fish, as well as all foods listed in category C.

Detergents: If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a kosher *le-Pesah* label.

Medicine: Since hametz binders are used in many pills, the following guidelines should be followed: If the medicine is required for life-sustaining therapy, it may be used on Pesah. If it is not for life-sustaining therapy, some authorities permit, while others prohibit. Consult Rabbi Wechsler. In all cases, capsules are preferable.

Kashering of utensils: The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to halakhah, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (ke-voleo kakh poleto). Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

A. Earthenware (china, pottery, etc.) may not be *kashered*. However, fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

B. Metal (wholly made of metal) utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should have water boiled in them which will overflow the rim.

C. Ovens and Ranges: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. Then, oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for a half hour. If there is a broil setting, use it. Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed and cleaned and then put through the self cleaning cycle. Continuous cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens.

Microwave ovens, which do not cook the food by means of heat, should be cleaned, and then a cup of water should be placed inside. Then the oven should be turned on until the water disappears. A microwave oven that has a browning element cannot be *kashered* for *Pesah*.

D. Glassware: Authorities disagree as to the method for *kashering* cooking utensils. One opinion requires soaking in water for three days, chang-

ing the water every 24 hours. The other opinion requires only a thorough scrubbing before *Pesah*, or putting them through a dishwasher.

E. After not using the dishwashing machine for a period of 24 hours, a full cycle with detergent should be run.

F. Electrical Appliances: If the parts that come into contact with hametz are removable, they can be *kashered* in the appropriate way (if metal, follow the rule for metal utensils). If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered. (All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned.)

G. Tables, closets and counters: If used with *hametz*, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used.

H. Kitchen Sink: A metal sink can be *kashered* by thorough cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.

I. Hametz and Non-Passover utensils: Non-Passover dishes, pots and hametz whose ownership has been transferred, should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.
