Selihot Services to be Held on Saturday Evening, September 4

Tisha B'Av has come and gone, which means that the High Holy Days are not far behind. The month of Elul, which precedes Rosh Hashanah, is a period of repentance. Although there are different minhagim as to recitation of selihot, the traditional Ashkanazi custom is to recite selihot beginning with the first day of the week (Saturday evening) in which Rosh Hashanah falls, provided that four days are left before Rosh Hashanah.

Or Zarua will continue its tradition of commencing our commemoration of the Yamim Noraim with selihot serices on Saturday evening, September 4th. Rabbi Wechsler will speak on *Mystical Repentance* starting at 9:00 p.m., followed by services at 10:00 p.m. The selihot prayers focus us on the upcoming Days of Awe and the challenge of Teshuvah awaiting each of us. It is a beautiful service, and we encourage you to attend, especially those of you who may not have participated in this service in prior years.

Charlie Sherman New Hebrew School Director

Charlie Sherman, long-time favorite teacher in Or Zarua's Hebrew School, has been chosen to succeed Michelle Schaerf as Director of the school.

Originally from suburban Minneapolis, MN, Charlie moved to New York to attend the Jewish Theological Seminary and Columbia University's Joint Program. He graduated from the Joint Program with a B.A. in Bible from JTS and a B.A. in Comparative Religion from Columbia. Following that, Charlie received the Sylvia C. Ettenberg fellowship in Jewish Education at the Seminary's William Davidson Graduate School of Jewish Education, which awarded him his M.A.

Charlie currently teaches second and fifth grade Jewish Studies and third and fifth grade Hebrew at the Rodeph Sholom School. Over the past three years he has taught the Bet, Hey, Vav and High School Ethics classes at Or Zarua's Hebrew School. In addition to teaching, Charlie has designed curriculum at the Seminary's Melton Research Center for Jewish Education and at the Board of Jewish Education's Learning Center.

A former counselor at Camp Ramah in Wisconsin, many of our congregants have benefited from Charlie's Bar and Bat Mitzvah tutoring. He led High Holy Day Junior Congregation Services this past year.

Why does a person go into Jewish education we asked our new Director? "My initial inspiration to pursue a career in Jewish Education came from my work as a teacher at the Shabbat School of my hometown synagogue, B'nai Emet, in Minneapolis. Everything seemed to fall into place after that."

We welcome Charlie Sherman to Or Zarua in this new role and look forward to spending wonderful years together with him and his wife Ellie.

Travel to Israel on Internet Wings

Thanks to the internet, members of Or Zarua can now have the sounds and voices of Israel delivered into their homes and offices. As other radio stations from around the world have been doing for a while, a number of Israeli radio stations are now broadcasting live on the internet. The quality of the broadcasts range from mono to stereo and with one Tel Aviv station you can even see a live picture of the studio. The vast majority of broadcasts from Israel are in Hebrew but even for those whose Hebrew is a bit rusty, the sounds of music from Jerusalem and Tel Aviv cut right through all language barriers.

To tune in to Israel all you need is a personal computer equipped with a sound card, speakers and an internet connection. The next requirement is a virtual "radio" which is available at no charge from Real Networks, a principal maker of the software which allows audio and video surfing. To obtain the Real Networks player, aim your browser to www.real.com and look for the free version of the Real Player G2. If you are a real gadgeteer, you can even pay for a fancy player with a stereo equalizer and all kinds of other virtual bells and whistles. Never worry, however, the plain old vanilla player is excellent and produces excellent sound. Fill out the usual download form and download the player to your PC and then click on the downloaded file to install the program. The downloading time is relatively fast by internet standards and the installation of this software is user friendly even if the user is not a certified computer maven.

With the hardware and software ready to take you across the miles, one of the best places to locate Israeli ra-

dio stations is at www.comfm.com, a web site that specializes in connecting you to audio and video we events all over the world. After landing at comfm.com, click on "live radios" and then click on the Israeli flag to take you to the list of Israeli stations. There you will find listed Kol Israel (Reshet Bet), Radio 10 (a religious Jerusalem station), Radio 100 FM (a popular Tel Aviv area station), Radio Haifa (a local station in the north), and Radio Tel Aviv 102 FM (another Tel Aviv station). While Arutz7 (the pirate radio ship) is listed, the listed link may not work. Click on the "Real Audio" icon to the right of the station of your choice and, if all works as it should, a stream of bits and bytes will arrive at your computer activating your Real Player and, within a few moments, your pc will transport you to the sounds of Israel. Get some falafel and chumus and you can complete the experience. Bo voyage.

A Story About Or Zarua's Sister Congregation in Tel Aviv, Kehilat Sinai

On the morning of June 14, 1999, seven youth from the Enoch School (Tel Aviv) for individuals with moderate retardation, joined the ranks of Jewish youth who mark their passage from childhood to young responsibility, from passive to active Judaism.

This ceremony, unlike others, found its origins five years ago when Rinat Danziger, an enthusiastic occupational therapist, watched the first group Bar/Bat Mitzvah for children with special needs at Hartzfeld School in Holon. She vowed to herself that, given the opportunity, she would bring the Bar/Bat Mitzvah project to her school. Last year she became principal of Enoch School and this year made her dream come true. She was the moving force in bringing the Conservative (Masorti) Movement into her non-religious school, convincing staff and parents alike of the positive joy of non-coercive Judaism.

The children came from varied backgrounds, with differing levels of support from their parents. One girl's mother celebrated her Bat Mitzvah in Israel with an aliyah to the Torah. Another girl's parents almost backed out, thinking their daughter too old, at age 17, to be celebrating this life cycle event. Their teacher, Rene Jacobs, created, initiated, taught and gave of herself in order to reach out to this group of eager, enthusiastic students. She took them to an army base to distribute mishloach manot on Purim. They went to a hospital to give gifts to sick children, bought with money the group donated to tzedakah. She taught them that they are capable of giving, not only of receiving. As this dedicated teacher quoted during the ceremony: "I have learned from all my teachers, but I have learned the most from my students."

Rabbi Roberto Arbiv, a veteran of these ceremonies, once again opened the doors of his Congregation Sinai, Midreshet Iyun- Or Zarua's sister congregation in Tel Aviv- to these special youth and their families. His fervent prayers and blessings reached every heart, bringing each congregant closer to the spiituality wihtin us, to the acceptance of the uniqueness of each one present, from a girls' seven-week old sister to another's 87-year-old grandparents. The school staff were overwhelmed at this new side of the children they teach daily, unabashedly crying tears of joy and nahat.

The Masorti Movement's History and Structure

The Masorti Movement in Israel was officially established in 1979 under the leadership of Rabbi Michael Graetz. Prior to that time there had been congregations throughout the country under the auspices of the United Synagogue of Israel and the Rabbinical Assembly of Israel. These two organizations joined to form the Masorti Movement. From only four congregations in 1972, the Movement has grown to include nearly 50 affiliated Masorti congregations around the country in all major cities and in a number of kibbutzim and moshavim, academic and religious centers, the Seminary of Judaic Studies (Machon Schechter), Kibbutz Hanaton and Moshav Shorashim, the NOAM Youth Movement, Ramah/ NOAM camp and Nahal Garin.

The first Israeli Conservative synagogue Congregation, Emet Ve'emuna, was established in 1936 by a community of German Jews who identified with the positive historical school of Jewish thought. Most of the other Masorti communities, formed by core groups of immigrants from English speaking countries who were familiar with Conservative ideology and the positive expressions of a pluralistic society, have come to include families and individuals from a wide
