# Hanukkah Begins Sunday evening, December 17th

Hanukkah (חָאָכָּה, also known as Hag HaUrim (חג הַאוּרִים) "The Feast of Lights" begins this year on Sunday evening, December 17th, and ends on Monday night, December 25th.

Hanukkah commemorates the culmination of the

war of the Hasmoneans, also called the Maccabbees. against the Greeks during the Hellenistic period in Jerusalem. The Temple had been defiled during the war, and was rededicated. A cruse of oil, said to be enough for only one day, was used to fuel the Menorah at the rededication; miraculously, the oil lasted eight days.

### Laws of Hanukkah

Hanukkah (חנכה) begins on the eve of the twenty-fifth day of Kislev and lasts eight days. Work is permitted during the eight days (except, of course, on Shabbat), but all signs of sadness are to be avoided. Fasting is forbidden, and at funerals, eulogies are omitted. At synagogue services, Hallel (אר המים) is recited each day, and the special Al Hanissim (אל הנסים) is recited at each Amidah (אמרדה). However, the days of Hanukkah are not like Yom Tov.

# How to Light Hanukkah Candles

- 1. On the first night, Sunday night, December 17th, after dark, one candle is placed in the rightmost branch (facing you), and one candle is lit for the *shamash*. On succeeding nights, one candle is added, beginning from the right.
- 2. Light the *shamash* from a match. While holding the *shamash*, the blessings below are recited. The candles are then lit from the *shamash*, from left to right.
- 3. On Friday night, the Hanukkah candles are lit before the Shabbat candles.
- 4. After the candles are lit, it is customary to sing Hanerot Halalu and Maoz Tzur.

Blessed are You O' Lord our God, King of the universe, who has sanctified us with his commandments and has commanded us to light the Hanukkah candles.

# Laws of Hanukkah

(continued from first page)

Hanukkah is marked by the kindling of lights at home and in the synagogue. Hence, it is also called the Festival, or Feast, of Lights. If oil is used for the Hanukkah lights, olive oil is preferred. If candles are used, wax candles are preferred. The weight of rabbinic opinion opposes the use of an electric Hanukkiyah.

One light is kindled on the first night of *Hanukkah*; an additional light is added each succeeding night, so that eight lights are kindled on the last night. The lights should be kindled after sundown. Three bendictions are recited before the kindling of the lights

on the first night; the first two are recited on each of the seven subsequent nights. After the blessings, and while kindling the lights, Hanerot Halalu (הנרות הללו), followed by Maoz Tzur (מערז צור), is sung. The Hanukkiyah should be placed where it is visible from the outside of the house, in order to proclaim the miracle of Hanukkah to all passers-by.

In addition to the candles we light each day is the special candle known as the Shamash (vpv). The extra candle is necessary because the Hanukkah candles themselves should not be used to light the other candles. The Shamash, therefore, is the candle used to light the other candles.

# Torah, Haftarah and Megillah Readers' Group News

On Sunday morning, November 12th, the first breakfast meeting of the Torah, Haftarah and Megillah readers' group was held at the synagogue building.

The first session was introductory. After getting into the mood by munching on bagels and *rugelah* (direct from the bakeries of Boro Park), and sipping local coffee, group members studied the foundations of the principles of reading of the sacred texts, including:

• What are the historical origins of the cantillation (trop)

 How do the cantillation marks help us understand the meaning of the text?

• What, in Jewish tradition, constitutes the Written Law, as apposed to the Jral Law?

 What did Ibn Ezra mean when he said, "Any interpretation of the text of the Torah which is not in accordance with the cantillation marks is not to be followed"?

 Why is it, according to Rashi, that the right hand is more important than the left?

- Is it true that the cantillation marks indicate the syllable where the emphasis is to be placed? (Answer: Not necessarily)
- Why are there two sets of marks for the reading of the Ten Commandments in Parashat Yitro and

Va'Etchanan?

 How does cantillation profoundly affect the meaning of a biblical verse?
 (Can two phrases with exactly the same words, have a completely different meaning? Yes, absolutely!
 See right column on this page!)

In future meetings, the Or Zarua Torah, Haftarah and Megillah readers' group will continue to explore these issues and other issues related to reading and understanding of Torah and the other sacred texts.

The group may be joined at any time. It is a forum for both

experienced and inexperienced readers to learn and discuss the halakha and traditions relating to cantillation and Hebrew grammar in the sacred texts of the Bible. Audio tapes and self-help texts for the learning of proper cantillation are made available to those who either wish to learn

cantillation or add polish to their existing skills. Those in attendance at the first meeting all received Haftarah tapes.

The next breakfast meeting of the Torah, Haftarah and Megillah readers' group will take place on *Sunday morning, December 10th, from 9:30 to 11 a.m.* The group will meet on the second Sunday of every month thereafter. All are invited, though a reading knowledge of Hebrew is required. Please call the Or Zarua office, 410-6041, to let us know if you are coming.

# Do You Know the Difference?
