Purim, Monday eve, March 4th Passover April 3rd through 11th

Party and Megillah reading at 5:45 p.m.

Get your costumes and noisemakers ready! Purim is almost here!

On Monday evening, March 4th, Purim will be ushered in by Or Zarua at the synagogue. The entire Megillat Esther will be read by our members. Following evening services and the Megillah reading, all are invited to partake in the eating of Hamantaschen. Beverages will also be served.

Purim commemorates the incidents referred to in the Scroll of Esther. The scroll describes an attempt by the wicked Haman to have the Jews of Persia destroyed. His plot, alas, was foiled by Mordecai and his cousin Esther. Although considered to be a minor holiday, Purim is nonetheless celebrated as a festive holiday of eating, drinking, and the sending of gifts, called Mishloah Manot, to less fortunate people in the community.

During the reading of the Megillah in synagogue, it is traditional to "blot out" the name of Haman by using noisemakers whenever his name is mentioned in the Scroll.

Congregational Second Seder on Thursday evening, April 4th

This year, *Pesah*, celebrating the exodus of the Israelites from Egyptian slavery, all as recounted in the Torah in the Book of Exodus, begins on Wednesday evening, April 3rd. Or Zarua will hold daily and evening Yom Tov services beginning with the evening service, at 6 p.m. on April 3rd at the synagogue building, 127 East 82nd Street. On April 4th, prior to the congregational seder, we will join Congregation Kehilat Jeshurun for evening services at 125 East 85th Street.

On Wednesday morning, April 3rd, at 7:30 a.m., the eve of *Pesah*, Rabbi Wechsler will conduct a *siyum bekhorim* for First Borns at the synagogue.

Passover is celebrated in the home with a Seder, at which, surrounding a festive meal featuring *Matzot* and *Maror* (bitter herbs), the story of the Passover is recalled.

Or Zarua members who can accommodate extra guests at their Seder and those who would like to partake of a Seder meal with a family should contact the Or Zarua office for information, or return the coupon in this issue.

On the second night of Passover, Or Zarua will host a Second Seder at the Ramaz Lower School, 125 East 85th Street, by reservation only. An invitation will be sent to the entire membership. Call the Or Zarua office for further information.

Passover Guide

How to make your home Kosher for Passover

This guide was prepared by the Rabbinical Assembly Committee on Jewish Law and Standards by Rabbi Mayer Rabinowitz. It was accepted by the Committee on December 12, 1984. The last paragraph of the introduction, as well as Part A under "Permitted Foods", have been amended to reflect more recent decisions of the Committee affecting the status of peanuts, peanut oil and certain cheeses.

The Torah prohibits the ownership of hametz (אמר leaven) during Pesah. Therefore, we arrange for the sale of the hametz to a non-Jew. The transfer, mekhirat hametz (מכירת חמץ), is accomplished by appointing an agent, usually the rabbi, to handle the sale. It is a valid and legal transfer of ownership. At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of ownership of the now-permitted hametz. If ownership of the hametz is not transferred before the holiday, the use of this hametz is prohibited after the holiday as well (hametz she-avar alav ha-Pesah).

Since the Torah prohibits the eating of hametz during Pesah, and since many common foods contain some admixture of hametz, guidance is necessary when shopping and preparing for Pesah. During the eight days of Pesah, hametz cannot lose its identity in an admixture. Therefore, the minutest amount of hametz renders the whole admixture hametz and its use on

Pesah is prohibited. However, during the rest of the year, hametz follows the normal rules of admixture, i.e., it loses its identity in an admixture of one part hametz and sixty parts of non-hametz (batel be-shishim). This affords us an opportunity to differentiate between foods purchased before and during Pesah.

What follows is a general guideline. However, Rabbi Wechsler should be consulted when any doubt arises.

Kosher *le-Pesah* labels that do not bear the name of a rabbi or one of the recognized symbols of rabbinic supervision, or which are not integral to the package, should not be used without consulting Rabbi Wechsler.

Prohibited foods include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereals, coffees containing cereal derivatives, wheat, barley oats, spelt, rye and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol. Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods (kitniyot קטניות) to the above list: rice, corn, millet, corn, legumes (beans and peas; however, string beans are permitted). The Committee on Jewish Law and Standards has ruled unanimously that peanuts and peanut oil are permissible, as peanuts are not actually legumes. Some Ashkenazic authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example, corn sweeteners, corn

oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities permit the use of all of the above. Consult Rabbi Wechsler for guidance in the use of these products.

Permitted foods: A. The following foods require no kosher le-Pesah (כשר לפסח) label if purchased prior to Pesah: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives (however, be aware that coffees produced by General Foods are not kosher for Passover unless marked KP); sugar, pure tea, salt (not iodized); pepper; natural spices; frozen fruit juices with no additives; frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes, see above); milk; butter; cottage cheese; cream cheese; ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft) and Camembert (soft); frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda.

B. The following foods require no kosher *le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during *Pesah:* fresh fruits and vegetables (for legumes, see above), eggs, fresh fish and fresh meat.

C. The following foods require a kosher *le-Pesah* label if purchased before or during *Pesah*: All baked products (*matzah*, cakes, *matzah* flour, farfel, matzah meal and any products containing *matzah*); canned or bottled fruit juices (these juices are often clarified with *kitniyot* which are not listed among the ingredients. However,

if one knows there are no such agents, the juice may be purchased prior to Pesah without a kosher le-Pesah label); canned tuna (since tuna, even when packed in water has often been processed in vegetable broth and/or hydrolyzed protein - however, if it is known that the tuna is packed exclusively in water without any additional ingredients or additives, it may be purchased without a kosher le-Pesah label); wine, vinegar; liquor, oils, dried fruits; candy; chocolate flavored milk; ice cream; yogurt; and soda.

D. The following processed foods (canned, bottled or frozen) require a kosher *le-Pesah* label if purchased during *Pesah*: milk, butter, juices, vegetables, fruit, milk products, spices, coffee, tea and fish, as well as all foods listed in category C.

Detergents: If permitted during the year, powdered and liquid detergents do not require a kosher le-Pesah label.

Medicine: Since hametz binders are used in many pills, the following guidelines should be followed: If the medicine is required for life sustaining therapy, it may be used on Pesah. If it is not for life sustaining therapy, some authorities permit, while others prohibit. Consult Rabbi Wechsler. In all cases, capsules are preferable.

Kashering of utensils: The process of kashering utensils depends on how the utensils are used. According to halakhah, leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (ke-voleo kakh poleto). Therefore, utensils used in cooking

are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

A. Earthenware (china, pottery, etc.) may not be *kashered*. However, fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

B. Metal (wholly made of metal) utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should have water boiled in them which will overflow the rim.

C. Ovens and Ranges: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. Then, oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for a half hour. If there is a broil setting, use it. Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed and cleaned and then put through the self cleaning cycle. Continuous cleaning ovens must be *kashered* in the same manner as regular ovens.

Microwave ovens, which do not cook the food by means of heat, should be cleaned, and then a cup of water should be placed inside. Then the oven should be turned on until the water disappears. A microwave oven that has a browning element cannot be kashered for Pesah.

D. Glassware: Authorities disagree as to the method for *kashering* cooking utensils. One

opinion requires soaking in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours. The other opinion requires only a thorough scrubbing before *Pesah*, or putting them through a dishwasher.

E. After not using the dishwashing machine for a period of 24 hours, a full cycle with detergent should be run.

F. Electrical Appliances: If the parts that come into contact with hametz are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way (if metal, follow the rule for metal utensils). If the parts are not removable, the appliance cannot be kashered. (All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned).

G. Tables, closets and counters: If used with *hametz*, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used.

H. Kitchen Sink: A metal sink can be *kashered* by thorough cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. If, however, dishes are to be soaked in a porcelain sink, a dish basin must be used.

I. Hametz and Non-Passover utensils: Non-Passover dishes, pots and hametz whose ownership has been transferred, should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.

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Chancellor Ismar Schorsch: Seminary Leader

Dr. Ismar Schorsch, our featured speaker at Or Zarua's Seventh Anniversary Party and Lecture on February 28th, is the sixth chancellor of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America and its Rabbi Herman Abramowitz Professor of Jewish History.

Under his leadership, the Seminary's commitment to Israel remains a top priority. Rabbi Schorsch helped create the Seminary's newest school, the Beit Midrash in Jerusalem. He also serves as Honorary President of Mercaz, Conservative Judaism's zionist action organization, and has co-led its last two delegations to the World Zionist Congress in Jerusalem.

Dr. Schorsch is one of the formost scholars in the field of modern Jewish history. His newest book, From Text to Context: The Turn to History in Modern Judaism, was recently published by University Press of New England.

Yehuda Nir to speak at Yom Hashoah service, April 15th at 8 p.m.

Dr. Yehuda Nir, a holocaust survivor and member of Or Zarua, will speak at Or Zaru's Yom hashoah service on April 15th at 8 p.m. at the synagogue.

Dr. Nir was born in 1930 in Lwow, Poland. In 1942, a year after his father was murdered by the Germans, Yehuda, his 18 year-old sister Lala, and their mother left Lwow with forged documents to support new Christian identities. Yehuda's experiences are recounted in the critically acclaimed book, *The Lost Childhood: A Memoir*, published by Harcourt Brace in 1989.

Dr. Nir, a psychiatrist, is on the executive board of The American Gathering of Holocaust Survivors, and a member of the Human Rights Committee of the American Psychiatry Association.

Torah, Haftarah and Megillah Readers' Group News

The two sentence fragments dramatically illustrate the critical role of cantillation as an indicator of both the proper pronuciation and the phrasing of a verse, giving a clear guide to its meaning.

"And he called in the name (of) the Lord" appears in

the Torah scroll exactly the same way in both cases. This is how the verses appear in the Chumash (in which the diacritical marks, or vowels, as well as the cantillation code are indicated):

וַיִּקְרָא בְּשַׁם ה: ۗ

וַיִּקְרָא בְשַׁם ה:

The cantillation marks are called: Mercha (downward curve to the left, under the accented letter), Tipcha (downward curve to the right) and Sof Pasuk ("end of verse"), but we are only concerned with the first two.

In the first instance, appearing in Bereshit, the verse speaks of Abraham. In this case, the word "vavikra" ("and he called") is marked, under the last syllable, with a Tipcha cantillation mark, indicating a rest, separating it from the balance of the phrase "b'shem hashem" ("in the

name of God"). This indicates the interpretation of the phrase: the subject "he" of the verse refers to Abraham as the one who called in the name of God.

In the second instance, in Sh'mot, the verse speaks of Moses. There, the term "vayikra" has a Mercha cantillation

mark, indicating that there is no rest (it "serves" the Tipcha The word which follows, "V'shem", is which follows). marked by a Tipcha, separating it from "Hashem". In this case, the subject "he" of the verse refers to God himself, who calls Moses in the name of God. Rashi cites to the previous chapter, Chapter 33, Verse 19, as an additional

proof text for this interpretation. In that verse, God says to Moses: "I will pass all of my goodness upon your face, and I will call in the name of God before you . . .

Notice also how the cantillation marks force the varying words pronunciation of the "v'shem" and "b'shem". Where the letter Bet (Vet) is preceeded by a word ending with the letter Aleph (or a number of other letters) and where the two words are connected as a part of the same phrase, the "Bet" becomes "Vet" (no "dagesh" or dot inside the letter). Where the preceding word, in this case "vayikra", has a "resting" cantillation mark, such as a Tipcha, between the two words, it divides the phrase, and forces the "Bet" to contain a

"dagesh".

An astute listener of a properly

read verse will hear the difference in the pronunciation and the cantillation, and may thus properly derive the correct meaning in each instance.

Do You Know the Difference?

The following two phrases from the Torah are written in the Torah scroll exactly alike, but they are interpreted differently by Rashi and other commentators. The first is from Genesis, Chapter 12, Verse 8 (Parashat Lekh Lekha); the second is from Exodus, Chapter 34, Verse 5 (Parashat Ki Teesa):

ויקרא בשם ה

ויקרא בשם ה

To find out how these phrases are pronounced and sung, and why, as a result, they have been given quite different interpretations by the sages, please join the Torah, Haftarah and Megillah Readers' Group. These and other secrets of the Torah will be unlocked. (Answer in next issue)
