Observing Tu B'Shevat

The idea of a new year for the trees is beautiful, but what is the motivation to create a holiday for trees? Tu B'Shevat arose originally to serve the administrative purpose of separating one fiscal year from another with respect to the mandatory tithes that were collected to support the Temple. For the purpose of tithing,

fruits flourishing before Tu B'Shevat would be counted in the prior year, and those gleaned from Tu B'Shevat onward would be counted for the upcoming year. The dividing line was placed in the middle of Shevat since the rainfall in the land of Israel is mostly complete at this point, such that fruits blossoming after this date

would naturally be viewed as belonging to the following year.

Poetic meanings have been layered upon the original practical purposes of the holiday through the ages. The mystical tradition views Tu B'Shevat as the turning point from the darkness of the winter continued on page 8



continued from page 1 toward the light of the spring. It is at this time of the year that the sap begins to run and that the first blossoms appear, heralding a new agricultural season, and also invoking the constant aspiration of turning from the darkness of exile to the light of redemption.

Tu B'Shevat also gives expression

to our connection with the Land of Israel. In fact, the holiday took on greater, not lesser, significance after the destruction of the Temple extinguished its original administrative purpose, as the desire to assert a connection with the Land took on greater force for Jews dispersed in other lands. In our times, Tu B'Shevat offers an opportunity to recall the heroic achievements of the first settlers of the modern State of Israel in

transforming the swamps and deserts into a viable and productive nation. In present days, it is also a natural invitation to focus on our concerns for environmental preservation.

Tu B'Shevat, the fifteenth day of the Hebrew month of Shevat (the "Tu" is a spoken form of the Hebrew letters that designate the number 15), is observed from Sunday evening, January 27th through Monday, January 28th.
