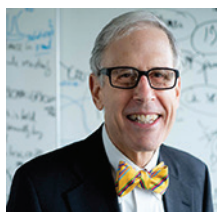


Save the Date: Tuesday, June 6, 7:30 pm
Jews and Genes
Editing, Ethics and New Frontiers
with Dr. Barry Collier and Rabbi Elliot Dorff

Advances in knowledge and technology have brought molecular and cellular biology to the point where genes can be sequenced and manipulated easily and rapidly. Such abilities have opened the door to a variety of approaches for the treatment of human disease. However, with that potential benefit comes a variety of ethical concerns, which, given the history of eugenics and other nefarious approaches to control human biology, make many people wary of our biological future.

To help us understand the promises and ethical challenges of gene biology, Or Zarua has invited congregant Dr. Barry Collier, the David Rockefeller Professor of Medicine and Physician-in-Chief at Rockefeller University Hospital and Rabbi Elliot Dorff, Professor of Jewish Theology at the American Jewish University (California) to discuss this topic.

Dr. Collier recently co-authored a new report on human gene editing as part of the Committee on Human Gene Editing sponsored by the National Academy of Sciences and National Academy of Medicine. A past president of the American Society



for Hematology and a leading researcher in platelet physiology, he has made significant contributions to the understanding and treatment of disorders of the blood. Among these contributions is the development of a monoclonal antibody that is used clinically to inhibit platelet function in order to prevent blood clots. He has received many awards and honors including the Stratton Medal

(2005); Karl Landsteiner Award (2013) and The Gill Heart Institute Award (2006). He is a member of both the Institute of Medicine and the National Academy of Sciences.

Rabbi Dorff is a leading thinker in the Conservative Movement on medical ethics. He has studied Judaism's approach to science. He is co-editor of a new book,



"Jews and Genes," (2015; Jewish Publication Society) which contains three essays that suggest varying answers as to why Jewish input on genetic developments should matter to both

Jews and non-Jews. He has served on the ethics committee of Hillary Clinton's Health Care Task Force, testified on ethical considerations for human cloning and stem cell research before the president's National Bioethics Advisory Commission, served on the National Human Resources Protections Advisory Commission, charged with reviewing and revising the federal guidelines on research on human beings. He is now on the California Ethics Advisory Commission for embryonic stem cell research done within the state.

Dr. Collier will discuss the Human Gene Editing report and share reflections about the science and medical ethics questions that were grappled with. Rabbi Dorff will then reflect on what the Jewish tradition has to say about new genetic technologies. A moderated discussion, led by Rabbi Bolton, will ensue after the presenters share their perspectives and insights. Join us on Tuesday, June 6 for what will be a dynamic evening. This presentation is open to all.

President's Message

This is my final newsletter message as Or Zarua president. It has been my privilege serving in that role for the past three years, and a pleasure writing

this bi-monthly column as one of my ongoing duties. I will miss Charlie's polite reminders of my newsletter deadlines.

Perhaps ambitiously, I have aimed through these articles to inspire greater engagement by congregants in the daily activities and rhythms of our extraordinary synagogue and a deeper attachment to Or Zarua's unique culture and mission. I hope I have succeeded in fulfilling those objectives, at least in some small measure. Knowing that even a few of you have regularly paid attention to these words has made the effort worthwhile.

If nothing else, putting hands to keyboard every two months for this column and ruminating about what makes Or Zarua so special has been inspirational and invigorating for me. Or Zarua has been an immense presence in my life for almost the entirety of its existence and for most of my adult years. It's hard for me to imagine the course of my life without Or Zarua. But conveying the uniqueness of the institution we've built together has reinforced my own commitment to it. Being obliged to articulate the distinctiveness of our shul, and why the Jewish world needs us, has enriched my appreciation for our venerable past, enlivened my celebration of our vibrant present, and bolstered my hopes for our prosperous future.

From past to present and towards the future. The trajectory of Or Zarua's institutional history is often on my mind. We have moved from modest beginnings to larger scale, and with that transition of time and space have come challenges, opportunities and successes.

When Joanne and I first encountered Or Zarua on Shabbat Shirah in early 1990, we found an unelaborate service in a small second-floor music room at the 92nd Street Y, followed by a spartan, but warm and welcoming, kiddush behind the last row of chairs. The Shabbat service, despite its small quantitative size, was – as is still true today – impressively marked by the high

quality of its full Torah reading, competent lay-led davening, and sophisticated rabbinic teaching. The excitement of those early days of a pioneering shul that was both entrepreneurial and traditional was contagious. In ensuing years, our numbers grew as our services migrated among locations, finally achieving permanence as we built our current elegant building.

We have maintained our communal enthusiasm and momentum despite the passage of time and the abandonment of our nomadic ways. As we move into our second generation and beyond our start-up phase, our heimish synagogue ambience still remains inviting to those who venture into our midst. We are now more established, but we cannot be complacent.

Rabbi Bolton has followed in Rabbi Wechsler's footsteps in prudently perpetuating our one-of-a-kind culture, yet has successfully paved a distinctive path of his own. Our Torah learning remains top-notch, even as the musicality of our services has improved over time. We have diverse activities for congregants of all ages, from toddlers through retirees; we are indeed a multi-generational shul community. Our youth education programs have been reinvigorated and refined, and young member families are numerous. Our synagogue building sturdily supports a plethora of programming on almost every day of the calendar year. Of course, to sustain all that activity, our building will require administrative care and financial attention as it ages. Collectively, we must abundantly support the special community we have nurtured.

The most resonant portion for me of our Shabbat service, when we are at our musical best, is our rousing collective prayer as we stand together to return the Torah to our (soon to be refurbished) ark: "Turn us to you Lord, and we shall return; renew our days as of old." That productive and inspirational blend of past and future, of both tradition and renewal, epitomizes Or Zarua's essence. We must be mindful of and respectful toward our past while always planning for an even brighter future. May we continue to fulfill that essential mandate in the years ahead. Blessed is God who has sustained us to this day.

Philip Sidney: *Leave me, O Love*

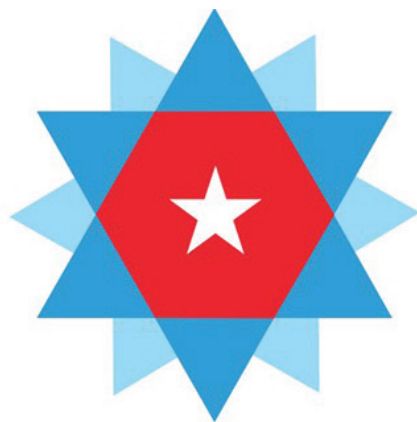
Leigh Hunt: *Jenny Kiss'd Me*

Elisha's Apostasy: Reward and Punishment in Jewish Thought

Marc Ashley's adult education course between Pesah and Shavuot

Sundays, May 7, 10:30 am & May 21, 7 pm

The second paragraph of the Shema, recited twice daily, stipulates that if we dutifully obey God's commandments we will be amply rewarded with material bounty in this world, and, conversely, that stern divine punishment will flow from our disobedience.

The Torah is full of statements of cause and effect between our human conduct and corresponding divine reactions. The divine math of reward and punishment is straightforward. The same theme is reflected in our High Holy Day liturgy. Yet does that conception of reward and punishment comport with our perspective of a world that often seems chaotic and unfair?

In our complex world, good people sometimes suffer and bad people often thrive. That disconnect between righteousness and reward can lead to a crisis of faith, as it did for Elisha ben Avuya, a respected second-century rabbinic scholar. The Talmud relates that Elisha was led to heresy when he witnessed the seemingly inexplicable death of a boy, who died while

fulfilling two commandments about which the Torah states that their observance will lead to prolonged life. If the fairness of God's methods of reward and punishment cannot be trusted, Elisha concluded, the overall religious system becomes suspect.

In the centuries since Elisha, Jewish thinkers have struggled to reconcile reality with expectation, and thereby to maintain faith in the face of suffering. God's punishments in this world often seem haphazard; divine justice is sometimes inscrutable. This theological challenge is particularly acute in the shadow of the

Holocaust, when millions perished without any apparent justification.

Please join us for the last two sessions (on May 7 and 21) of Marc Ashley's annual adult education course on the important topic of reward and punishment in Jewish thought. You are very welcome to join the class even if you missed the first two sessions, and no prior background is required. We will survey classical Jewish texts and modern commentaries as we together explore the intellectual history and continuing relevance of this provocative doctrine.
