Hanukkah Commences Thursday Evening, December 21st

Hanukkah commences on Thursday evening, December 21st, which is the 25th of Kislev. While Hanukkah is not mentioned in the Torah as it happened after the Torah was given, nor is it a festival like Passover, Shavuot or Sukkot. It is more a historical than a religious holiday. That's not to suggest that Hanukkah isn't important. On the contrary, the eight day holiday celebrates the Jewish military victory against the Syrians, in which a lone bottle of oil miraculously lasted for eight days when it should have lasted one day.

The Sages decreed that eight days beginning with the 25th of Kislev should be days of rejoicing; Hallel be recited, and that lights be lit at the entrance of the house, each of the eight nights, so as to publicize the miracle.

As it is written: "they made it a Yom Tov for praise and thanksgiving." Praise refers to the literal recitation of Hallel, and therefore the complete Hallel is recited during Shacharit on all eight days of Hanukkah. The term "thanksgiving" refers to the recitation of "Al Hanisim" (for the Miracles), a prayer of gratitude included in the

Shemoneh Esreh, during all days of Hanukkah, as well as in Birkat Hamazon (Grace after meals).

On the first night, only one candle is lighted. Looking at the menorah, it is the one on the far right. On the second night, two lights are lighted, and so on through the eighth night, when the entire menorah is lighted.

Although the lights are added toward the left, the candles in the Hanukkah menorah are kindled from left to right- the most recent candle is lit first. We recite three barachot (blessings) on the first night of Hanukkah, including the

Sheheheyanu.

remaining nights, only the first two barachot are said. The candles should be lit in the home immediately after dark; on Shabbat the Hanukkah candles should be kindled before the Shabbat lights. The candles should burn for 30 minutes. The lighting of the menorah is done as a public mitzvah and should be done where others can see the menorah through a window or in a hallway. The lighting of the Hanukkah lights is a positive obligation for both men and women. Children above the age of nine should also light candles unless another does it for him or her.

The New Year is off to a terrific start at the Or Zarua Hebrew School! We are working diligently to provide a challenging and exciting course of study for the 2000-2001 school year. We are proud to offer 10 classes for our students, who range in age from 5 to 16 years old. We have a wonderful group of teachers who are skilled at communicating to our students the beauty of the Jewish tradition and who are able to give our children the tools to become lifelong learners. Over the course of the summer we worked vigorously to update the curriculum, finding the best materials and textbooks in print today. We also revamped the Shabbat morning program, focusing on the theme of "Shabbat" throughout the year, so that the students come to and understand the fullest sense of all that the day means for the Jewish people. In addition, for the first time ever, the school offered elective courses to the students of the Dalet, Hey and Vav classes. Students had the opportunity to choose from three different courses and do text studies in each of these courses. These electives will also give the students an opportunity to meet and learn with new teachers. Finally, the Hebrew program and Tefillah (prayer) curriculum are receiving more attention than ever before. The Hebrew books that the students are using have outstanding activities. When coupled with their teacher's excellent instruction, the students are learning it better than ever. Finally, we have broadened the repertoire of prayers we are teaching our students. Through this they are receiving a richer Hebrew School experience. Overall, we are continuing to provide a strong sense of belonging to the greater Jewish community.

We are all looking forward to watching the students grow as they progress in their Judaic and Hebrew studies during the weeks and months ahead.

On April 19th, 2001, Jewish students will once again make history as they march on Yom HaShoah, Holocaust Remembrance Day, from the concentration camp of Auschwitz to the death camp of Birkenau. Since 1988 Jewish high school students have been retracing the steps of their ancestors throughout Poland. The March of the Living has brought together students from around the world to show the solidarity of the Jewish people.

The March of the Living is not only about remembering the death and destruction of the Holocaust, it is also about learning to appreciate the grandeur of 1,000 years of Jewish Life in Eastern Europe. Immediately after exploring our heritage in Poland the group will fly to

Israel. As we commemorate Yom HaZikaron, Israeli Memorial Day, and celebrate on Yom HaAtzmaut, Israel's Independence Day, we grasp the significance of the State of Israel and the constant struggle to maintain it.

Education - A Mirror of the Jewish Soul

In this new workshop, members of OZ will now have the opportunity to explore, in depth, the 'davening', the Shabbat service and its prayer book, the Siddur, to really understand with "n-sha'mah-Jewish soul" - what we're doing in the synagogue, and how to do it. We'll discuss the origin of the prayers, why are they in this sequence and not that, why pray in Hebrew, what does it mean when we stand, or bow, etc.

You don't need to be fluent in Siddur Hebrew or to have had very much background. The course will continue through mid-Spring and will start with Shabbat morning. It will cover subjects like the different hymns and how essential they are, the role of the Psalms, how the prayers change for a new moon, the reading of the Torah and its various traditions.


Harry Trattner, president of a strategic planning and development firm, who is also an ordained Hazzan from the Jewish Theological Seminary, is the instructor.


are welcome to attend what promises to be a very interesting discussion.
