High Holy Days 5760

The Jewish New Year for the year 5760 begins Friday evening, September 10th. Services for erev Rosh Hashanah begin at 6:00 p.m. As in previous years, the Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services will be held at the Ramaz School, 60 East 78th Street.

Shaharit for the first day of Rosh Hashanah begins at 8:30 a.m. Minhah and Maariv will be at 7:00 p.m. Services for the second day of Rosh Hashanah also will begin at 8:30 a.m. Because the first day of Rosh Hashanah falls on Shabbat, Tashlikh will take place on the second day of the Yom Tov instead of the first day. We will meet at the Central Park Reservoir for Tashlikh at 5:45 p.m., followed by evening services at 7:00 p.m. All services this year will be at the Ramaz Upper School.

On Rosh Hashanah, we blow the shofar. It is a positive commandment to hear the shofar blasts on Rosh Hashanah. Rabbi Saadya Gaon stated that there were ten reasons for the blowing of the shofar: 1) because Rosh Hashanah marks the beginning of creation; 2) because Rosh Hashanah is the first of the ten days of repentance; 3) to remind us of our stand at the foot of Mt. Sinai; 4) to remind us of the words of the prophets; 5) to remind us of the destruction of the Temple; 6) to remind us of the binding of Isaac; 7) so that we tremble and bow our will to the will of the Creator; 8) to remind us of the Day of Judgment; 9) to remind us of our hope for the gathering of the dispersed of Israel; and 10) to remind us of the revival of the dead. Or Zarua Celebrates the Joy of Sukkot

Five days after Yom Kippur, on Friday evening, September 24, the holiday of Sukkot commences. Sukkot is a festival rich in mitzvot, including the mitzvah of sukkah and the mitzvah of the lulav and etrog. It is a festival of joy to celebrate the completion of the Days of Awe, and one of the three pilgrimage festivals mentioned in the Torah.

Sukkot, occurring six months after Pesah, is integrally connected with the Exodus from Egypt. While Pesah celebrates the miracle of the departure from Egypt, Sukkot celebrates the forty-year journey through the wilderness that followed. The freedom of the Jewish

people came not merely from the moment of triumph while crossing the Red Sea, but also from the hard years of wandering in the desert, years in which the faith of the people was hardened and solidified. Without that profound faith, who could have survived the many years of desert wanderings. It is for this reason that some refer to Pesah as the holiday of faith, and Sukkot as the holiday of faithfulness. See Rabbi Y. Greenberg, The Jewish Way: Living the Holidays (Touchstone 1988), p.97.

In the time of the Temple, the crowning event of the holiday was the libation of water, the nisuh hamayim. The festivities associated with

The Talmud class is free to members and nonmembers alike, and may be joined at any time. Knowledge of Hebrew or Aramaic is not required.

Time is Running Out to Sign Up for 7-Session Hebrew and Mahzor Crash Courses

Rabbi Stephen Shulman —Jewish Chaplain at Memorial Sloan Kettering, seasoned Hebrew teacher and wonderful rabbi — will once again teach two courses: Beginners Hebrew and Introduction to the High Holy Day Mahzor.

Beginning the day after Labor Day, you'll have the opportunity to either start from the beginning or to brush up in preparation for the High Holy Days. Classes will take place at the Or Zarua Beit Midrash, 1384 Lexington Avenue, on September 7, 8, 9, 13, 14, 15 and 16. The Beginners Class is scheduled from 7:00 - 8:00 PM; the Intro to the Mahzor class from 8:15 - 9:15 PM. Beginners text will be Shalom Aleichem; the Intro course will use the Harlow Mahzor, the edition used at Or Zarua. Both books are available at Feller's, 1205 Lexington Avenue (between 81st and 82nd Streets).

There is no charge for either course for Or Zarua members. There is a \$100 fee for nonmembers. In either case, you must call the synagogue office (410-6041) to reserve a place.


Since Rosh Hashanah falls on Shabbat, there will be no blowing of the shofar on the first day.

the nisuh hamayim were known as the simhat beit hashoe'vah, since the waters that were used in the ceremony came from the pool of Shiloah in the city of David. The intense power of the ceremony is reflected in the Talmud, Tractate Sukkah (53) (translation taken from E. Kitov, The Book of Our Heritage, vol. 1, p. 179):

"Men of piety and good deeds used to dance before them [the lamps] with lighted torches in their hands, and sing songs and praises. And Levites without number with harps, lyres, cymbals and trumpets and other musical instruments were there upon the fifteen steps leading down from the court of the Israelites to the court of the women, corresponding to the fifteen songs of ascents in their Psalms. It was upon these that the Levites stood with their instruments of music and sang their songs. Two cohanim stood by the upper gate which led down from the court of the Israelites to the court of the women, with two trumpets in their hands. When the cock crowed they sounded a teki'ah, a truah, and again a teki'ah. When they reached the tenth step they sounded a teki'ah ...

. They proceeded sounding their trumpets until they reached the gate which led out at the East; they turned their faces from East to West and proclaimed: 'Our Fathers who were in this place (stood) with their backs toward the Temple of the Lord, and their faces toward the East, and they worshipped the sun toward the East, but as for us, our eyes are turned to the Lord.' Rabbi Yehudah stated, they used to repeat (the last words) and say 'we are the Lord's and our eyes are turned to the Lord.'"

Our traditional, but somewhat less exotic, services will commence on Friday evening with Minhah and Maariv at 6:00 p.m. Shaharit services both days will start at 9:00 a.m., with Minhah and Maariv services at 6:45 on Saturday evening. Morning services will be at the 92nd Street Y. Evening services at Shaary Tefila on 79th Street. Please remember that on Shabbat we do not daven with lulavim and etrogim.

Each year, we build our congregational sukkah in the garden of the Synagogue office. Or Zarua's Hebrew School will decorate the sukkah during the day before the holiday. Please contact the office for further information.

Members of the Congregation who would like to bring kosher meals to the sukkah during Hol Hamoed may make reservations with the Or Zarua office. Because of space limitations and logistical considerations, we ask that you contact the office as soon as possible to make your reservations.

Shemini Atzeret commences on Friday evening, October 1, with services at 6:00 p.m. at Shaaray Tefila. Shaharit services, including Yizkor services, will be at 9:00 am on Saturday morning at the 92nd Street Y.

We will close our celebration of the holidays with Simhat Torah. The dancing and singing will start on Saturday evening, with services at 6:00 p.m. We will continue with Shaharit services at 9:00 a.m. on Sunday morning. Both services will be held at the 92nd Street Y.

A new chapter...

The last service in Or Zarua's building on 82nd Street has taken place, closing a chapter in the life of our congregation. Unbelievably, 5 years have passed since we moved into the building. It has been a very productive time for us. We have grown (we are now a congregation of more than 350 members!) and changed, adding a Kabbalat Shabbat service, adult education offerings, and a Purim spiel among other programming. And though we had always intended to build a bigger space on the site, during the time that we have lived and grown within it, this old building - with all of its idiosyncrasies and inadequacies - has become our home, a part of us. It has been good to us and for us; it has enabled us to grown and live.

Now, after years of planning and fundraising, we are ready and excited for the new chapter to begin. If our congregation could flourish in a space that offered so little, just imagine what wonderful things will happen when our resources are so considerably expanded! When it is completed, our new home will rise 7 stories, housing our sanctuary, school, offices, library, social hall, and to top it all (literally!) a sukkah. With the contract signed for construction and

a loan contract not far behind, the process of building our new home expected to start at the end of August. The contract anticipates a 13month construction period - with any luck we will be back home on 82nd Street by the end of 2000.

While the Capital Caampaign continues, we want to thank the many members of the congregation who have contributed their time, thought, creativity and care - and dollars - for making this new chapter possible. We eagerly look forward to celebrating what we will have accomplished together at our first Shabbat in the new building.
