Or Zarua adds many new members to its growing numbers



Rosh Hashanah begins Sunday night, Sept. 24th; Services at 60 E. 78th St.

This year, the Jewish New Year, Rosh Hashanah (ראש השנה) begins on Sunday evening, September 24th. Or Zarua will hold day and evening services for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur at the auditorium at 60 East 78th Street (between Madison and Park Avenues), which will be specially outfitted for the occasion. A complete schedule of High Holy Day services is printed on page 5.

Each member in good standing of Or Zarua will receive a ticket which is required for admission to services. Members may purchase additional tickets for visiting family members at \$125 each. Seating capacity is limited, so come early to all services for a choice seat.

As is our custom at Or Zarua, services are led, and the Torah is read, by volunteer members of the congregation on High Holy Days, as well as throughout the year.

Yamim Noraim

The ten days commencing with Rosh Hashanah, and ending with Yom Kippur, are known as Yamim Noraim (ימים נוראים), or "Days of Awe." This marks a period of intense contemplation, reflection and repentance. Thus, these days are also known as Asseret Yemei T'shuvah, or Ten Days of Repentence. The Shabbat which falls between Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur is called Shabbat Shuva ("Return") so called because of the first words of the Haftarah read on that day.

Ushering in the High Holy Days: The month of Elul, the shofar and Slihot

Sukkot Celebrated October 9th - October 17th

Sukkot (סוכות) begins on Sunday evening, October 8th. Or Zarua will celebrate Sukkot this year with services on Sunday and Monday evenings, and Monday and Tuesday mornings, October 9th and 10th. Evening services begin at candle lighting time and morning services begin at 9 a.m. All services will be held at Or Zarua's building at 127 East 82nd Street. The morning services will be followed by Kiddush in our Sukkah in the backyard of the Or Zarua office. Shmini Atzeret services will be held one week later, on Sunday evening, October 15th and Monday morning, October 16th. That evening, at 6:30 p.m., Simhat Torah services will be held. preparation for the High Holy Days. The Shofar is sounded each morning at daily (not on Shabbat and not on Erev Rosh Hashanah) services during the month of Elul to remind us that Rosh Hashanah is near. Before Rosh Hashanah, (this year, Saturday night, September 16th, because Rosh Hashanah begins early in the week) special "forgiveness" prayers, drawn from the liturgy of the High Holy Days, called Slihot, are recited each day, until Yom Kippur.

Or Zarua will hold Slihot Services on Saturday night, September 16th from 9-11 p.m. in the synagogue building, 127 East 82nd Street, between Park and Lexington Avenues. At 9 p.m., Rabbi Wechsler will lecture on the subject of repentence. The service begins at 10:00 p.m. following the lecture.

Erev Yom Kippur

On the day preceding Yom Kippur, Tuesday, October 3rd, *Kaparot* (forgiveness) prayers are recited in the synagogue, and special charitable gifts are offered. Toward evening, a final meal called Seudah Hamafseket is eaten before the fast of Yom Kippur.

Sanctuary Notes

When you come to the synagogue on *Shabbat* or *Yom Tov* morning, please help us out, by observing these rules:

Due to our limited space

- 1. Move up to the front of the sanctuary.
- 2. Sit as close to the wall as you can, and
- 3. Don't save seats

If you received a notification that you will be called for the honor of an aliyah to the Torah commemorating a yahrzeit or other event, please insure that you arrive at the synagogue early, and let our Gabbai know that you are there. If you are a Kohen or Levi (or bat Kohen or Levi), please indicate that fact to the Gabbai.

Please note that all orders are priced in accordance with the quality of the Etrog; however, all of the Etrogim, regardless of price, are certified for use on Sukkot. A Standard set costs \$31. Muvchar (Choice) at \$37 and Mehudar (Gorgeous) at \$48 Etrogim are offered for those who can afford them. All orders are delivered in complete sets with the four minim: Etrog in box, bagged Lulav with Hadassim and Aravot. All orders must be placed by telephone to the Or Zarua office, 410-6041, on or before October 2nd. You may mail in your check for the purchase at the time you make the order or you will be billed. Your order may either be picked up at the Or Zarua office on Friday, October 6th between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m., or on Sunday, October 8th between 10 a.m. and noon.

Weekly Talmud Class to Resume on Wednesday, October 18th

Rabbi Wechsler will resume teaching the regular weekly Talmud Class beginning on Wednesday evening, October 18th from 8 to 9:30 p.m. and on Wednesday evenings thereafter. The class meets in the Bet Hamidrash on the lower level of the synagogue building, 127 East 82nd Street. The subject will be Masekhet Berakhot (מסכת ברכות) which we began to study last year. This tractate discusses the prayers of the liturgy. The class is taught in English; no prior knowledge of Hebrew or Aramaic is required, and the class may be joined at any time.

The first meeting of the class is introductory to the subject of Talmud study in general and is intended for those who are new to Talmud study, or who wish to brush-up on fundamentals of the Talmud.
